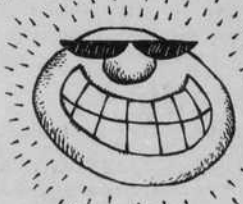

With the Ems 3-2 win, Regier successfully began his four-game stint as the team's temporary manager Monday evening under less-than-ideal conditions. He's filling in for Eugene's manager, Danny Sheaffer, who was fined and suspended for four games after twice being ejected and also reportedly bumping home-plate umpire Tim Strike repeatedly with his stomach and chest last week.

"We woulda been in town anyway," Regier said. "But it's an unfortunate situation for Danny to have to serve this suspension. It's something that we're gonna have to work on; it's not part of the Cub organization's philosophy to have this happen."

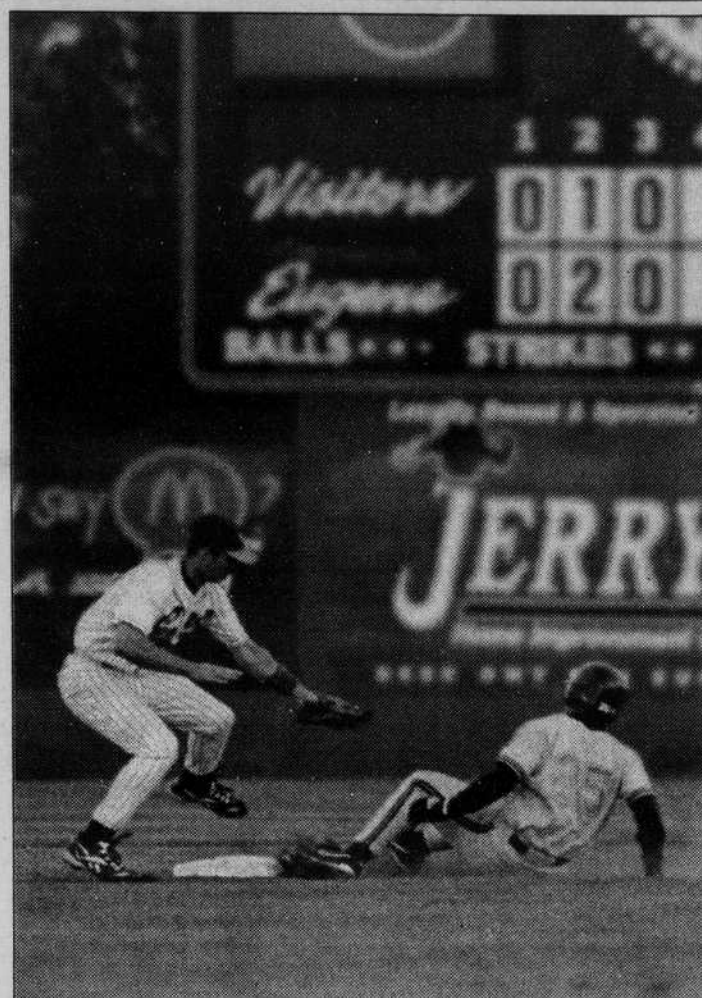
Even so, the man in charge of all of the Cubs roving instructors collected his first professional-coaching victory on a beautiful evening. He won't get credit for it — Eugene is Sheaffer's team — but he did a good job stepping in and not messing anything up.

"He let us play," pitching coach Tom Pratt said. "When we have instructors in, the kids try a little bit harder, they want to impress everybody. But for the most part, it was business as usual. 'Sheaff' has these kids really well prepared."

Considering that the last time Regier had full-time managing duties was in 1981 and 1982 at Chabot Junior College in Hayward, Calif., his nearly impromptu managerial performance was worthy of an Emmy nomination.

From the deliberate, earnest way he delivered his signals and encouragement to Ems' players to the familiar hands-on-knees pose he struck throughout the contest, Regier was a believable fill-in.

He was also a competent one. The Ems scored the go-ahead run

in the eighth, thanks in large part to their ability to execute the hit-and-run, called by Regier.

After the game, Regier said he was impressed with the progress the Ems made since the last time he was in town earlier this season.

"They've started to become professional, and that's the goal," Regier said, noting that many of the Ems are rookies this season. "By the end of the year, we want them to understand the difference between college baseball and professional baseball."

all) to a 3-2 victory over the Aquasox (18-18).

Everett jumped on the board first in the top of the second inning, scoring designated hitter Mike Abete from third on a sacrifice fly to center by Everett third baseman Justin Leone. The third baseman from Las Vegas would go on to drive in another run in the fourth inning to account for both of Everett's runs on the day.

However, Curry had already turned the tables on Everett by then. With two out and two men on in the bottom of the second, Curry pushed a Sam Walton fastball to the gap in right field, scoring Eugene shortstop Tony

Gsell and first baseman Pete Zoccolillo to give the Ems a 2-1 lead.

"A bunch of us came out early and worked with our hitting instructors, that was the focus of the day," Curry said. "With a left-hander, I tried to drive the ball in the gap and hit it hard."

Eugene's winning run would come on a wild pitch by Everett reliever Tim Burton in the eighth. The pitch Burton threw to Ems third baseman Ryan Gripp got away from Everett catcher Mark Carrol, allowing centerfielder Ben Johnstone to score from third.

Conroy provided the base for the Emeralds win, pitching six innings and only allowing two runs. After problems with his control in

the first couple of innings, Conroy composed himself and subdued the visiting Everett club.

"Felt all right, felt a little slick tonight," said the 4-1 right-hander.

Conroy was relieved in the seventh by Ems closer Tim Lavery, who pitched three innings of one-hit ball and got the win, improving his record to 2-1.

The real motivation for the win seemed to come from the absence of Sheaffer. The Ems wanted to have a better record to give Sheaffer upon his return to the dugout, Curry said.

"We're gonna stick together," Curry said, "and when he gets back, we're just gonna keep on going."
