Macheezmo Mouse chairman dies in plane crash

PORTLAND — A float plane piloted by the head of a Mexican health food restaurant chain carrying his three sons crashed into the Columbia River, killing all aboard.

William S. "Tiger" Warren, the 48-year-old chairman of Portland-based Macheezmo Mouse, was flying to the family's summer home in Washington with sons Jack, 14; Will, 13; and Rob, 9, after a Thanksgiving gathering, family members said.

The plane went down about 3 p.m. Saturday near the Washington side of the river, about 45 miles east of Portland, shortly after it left the water and began climbing into the sky, said Dave Cox, spokesman for the Skamania County sheriff's office.

"Witnesses said the plane was taking off, banking sharply to the left, and then went down," Cox said.

Dive teams on Saturday retrieved two bodies, a man believed to be Warren and a child. Two other bodies were pulled from the plane Sunday.

tion, Gulf Countries Council Student Union, Hawaiian Club, Korean Student Association, the Permas (Indonesian student group), The Students of the Indian Subcontinent and Vietnamese Student Association, that allow all fee-paying University students to become voting members. In addition, members are allowed to vote in these groups regardless of their ethnicity and nationality, according to their constitutions filed in the ASUO.

The Chinese Students Association allows all fee-paying students to vote in the executive elections. Annie Lo, Chinese Students Association public relations officer, said the group wants to include University students as members and respect their opinions regardless of their ethnicity and nationality.

William Gonzalez, ASUO international student advocate intern, said ethnic student groups should focus on promoting their cultures in the University and should not exclude students' participation based on race and nationality.

Gonzalez, who was from Puerto Rico, is now the treasurer of The Students of the Indian Subconti-

ment, and is allowed to vote in the group. According to the group's constitution student members, who are defined as "any student who is registered at the [University] ... may vote to elect the officers of the SIS."

On the other hand, the Singapore Students Association is still in the process of changing its constitution.

Peng Lim, the SSA president, said he realized the existing problems in the group's constitution, which was written about six years ago. He said he would seek advice from the advisor in the Office of International Education and Exchange regarding the changes in the group's constitution.

Lim said it would be good to include other international students, who have been contributed to the organization, in the executive positions. He said non-Singaporean students should have attended the group's meetings, as the basic involvement, before they can vote.

However, the changes in the SSA's constitution would not happen soon. Lim said the organization needs to get approval from current members before any changes can be made in its constitution and it would take a few months to have the votes.

Influenza vaccine may be given to persons wishing to reduce their chances of catching the flu, persons who provide essential community services and students or others in schools or colleges.
