Stanford too much for Ducks

■ Oregon makes a game of it, but the Cardinal proves to be too strong and too savvy, winning Saturday 85-71

Lines began forming as early as 4:30 p.m. — two-and-a-half hours before tip-off — outside the McArthur Court doors on Saturday.

As the Batman-like spotlight shined above into the dark sky, fans prepared themselves for a Pacific-10 Conference basketball game between Oregon and the No. 3 Stanford in which they were certain to play a major role.

And boy did they. It's just that the Ducks happened to be playing the one team with enough poise to overcome the deafening noise generated by the sold out crowd of 9,087, as Stanford came away with the 85-71 win.

"Our crowd has always been great and they were awesome tonight," said senior forward A.D. Smith, who knocked down two first-half free throws to become the 10th player in Oregon history to record 1,000 points and 500 rebounds. "It was probably the best I've seen in my time here. It's a shame that we let them down like this, but if there is any team in the conference that wouldn't get rattled, it's [Stanford]."

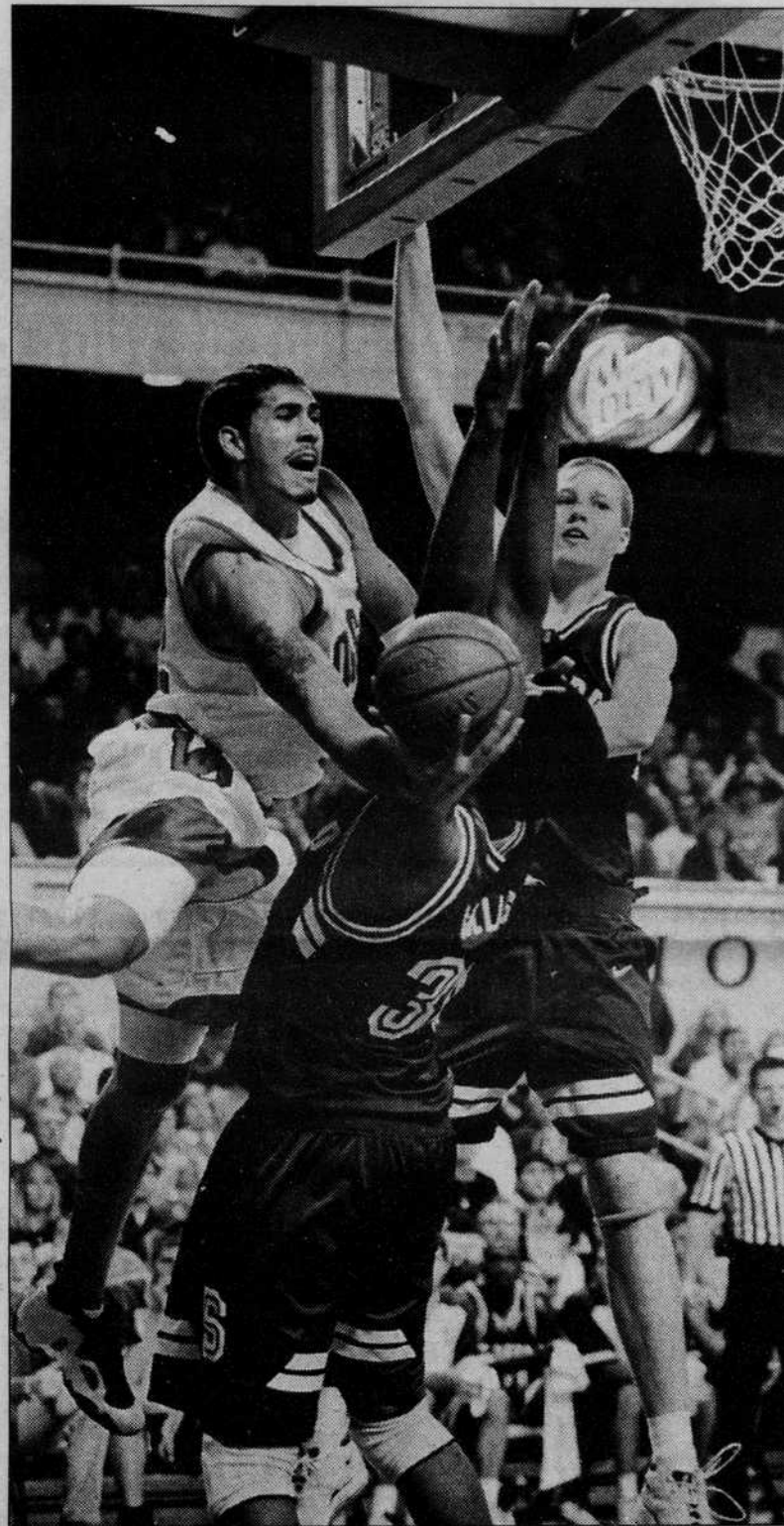
The loss dropped the Ducks to 11-3 overall and 2-1 in Pac-10 play, and propelled Stanford to a mark of 14-1, 3-1.

Mark Madsen has been a staple for Stanford in recent years. The preseason All-American's clutch play has led his team to three NCAA Tournament berths in his three years with the team — includ-

Oregon held Madsen to just four points and made him a non-factor, but twin brothers Jarron and Jason Collins burned the Ducks for a combined 27 points in the Cardinal's 85-71 victory.

Women lose momentum, lead, ranking

The Ducks fall victim to a bewildering comeback at Stanford, as the Cardinal puts together a 46-point swing to beat Oregon 78-62

"Momentum into the millennium" boasts the cover of the Stanford women's basketball media guide.

No kidding. Because when the momentum shifted in favor of the now-No. 25 Cardinal (10-4 overall, 3-1 Pacific-10 Conference) and away from

Oregon (11-4, 2-1) Saturday in Palo Alto, Calif., there was no stopping it, no getting out of its way and, lastly, no win at Maples Pavilion for the defending Pac-10 champs.

After thoroughly dominating most of the first half, the now-unranked Ducks couldn't hold a 26-point lead, eventually getting doused by 16, 78-62 in front

of 3,345 fans.

That's a 42-point swing in less than 24 minutes.

The efficiency of the turnaround was astounding. The magnitude of it unmatched in the history of the Stanford program.

Maybe it was that vaunted Maples' mystique — which Cardinal players re-
