

Oregon lacrosse loses opener

Men's lacrosse suffers a setback at home in its opener against Chico State

Last Sunday the Oregon Club Sports men's lacrosse team began its season against California State, Chico at the new turf field adjacent to the Recreation Center.

Although Oregon lost the exhibition game 11-9 to the Wildcats, the Ducks are keeping their heads held high.

Oregon coach Josh Barbour said he saw a lot of improvement com-

pared to last year's game against the Wildcats.

He added that his team's transitions between offense and defense should improve as the season progresses.

The Ducks' leading scorer was James Hall, who had four goals. Jared Blanchette had three goals.

Oregon tied the game twice, taking advantage of a one-man-up situation, but Chico State never gave up the lead.

Despite the loss midfielder Cameron Kossen said he was impressed by how the team stayed close until the end.

"It is a good start [for our team]," Kossen said.

"We needed to see where our team is and to try some of our new players."

Kossen says the team was able to do that and it is looking at a promising season. The Ducks play against Puget Sound this Saturday on the same turf field.

Don't knock on Norwood

A pleasant surprise for the Ducks last weekend was the superb play of guard Anthony Norwood. The 6-3 sophomore guard from Tucson returned to his home state, scored 19 points in the two games against the desert schools and started in place of Alex Scales, whose minutes have been reduced due to a knee injury.

Oregon forward A.D. Smith said Norwood's contributions were important last weekend.

"Anthony played great," Smith said. "He played well both Thurs-

day and Saturday. It's good to see him come home and do that. He took care of the ball and shot the ball well, and he hit some big shots in [against Arizona] that really would have been big if we would have been able to pull it out."

Kent said Norwood's play is just one example of Oregon's depth.

"With Alex coming off the bench, it has allowed Anthony to grow," Kent said. "He's coming now. As he grows individually, it strengthens our team, and it will allow us to gel and become a better basketball team. The encouraging thing is the depth has stepped up when guys go down with an injury."
