In a season marred by underachievement, Washington found reason to smile Saturday night.


In the Oregon camp, Saturday's loss was hardly a laughing matter.

The Ducks shot 18 percent from the field in the second half, which included a ten minute scoring drought. They allowed the Huskies to pull out their biggest win of the season, 67-58, and leave Oregon (18-6 overall, 8-4 Pacific-10 Conference) in third place. The Ducks' lead over Arizona State is now just one game.

Washington (9-16, 4-9) refused to fall prey to the rowdy crowd at The Pit, although it wasn't the first time this season the Huskies played above expectations away from Seattle.

pepperoni pizzas waiting to be devoured.

On this night, it was Green who led his Huskies (9-16 overall, 4-9 Pacific-10 Conference) to the gutcheck 67-58 upset victory over the Ducks (18-6, 9-4).
