JUNIOR COLLEGE

Jose Arroyo, P, 5-11, 185, Van Nuys, Calif. (Pasadena City College/VNHS). Last season's first-team all-Mission Conference punter doubled as the school's long-range field goal threat.

David Martin, LB, 5-11, 199, Clayton, Calif. (Los Medanos College/De La Salle). The Mustangs' two-time MVP garnered all-Empire League and all-Region I accolades during the 1999 and 2000 seasons for a squad finishing last year with a 5-6 ledger.

Courtney Miller, CB, 6-1, 189, St. Louis, Mo. (Fort Scott CC/Hazelwood East). Earned second-team all-Kansas Jayhawk Conference acclaim in his lone campaign at Fort Scott in 2000.

Junior Siavii, DT, 6-5, 335, American Samoa (Butte College). Garnered first-team all-NorCal Conference honors in his lone season at Butte after transferring from Dixie College after his freshman year.

Darrell Wright, DE, 6-3, 235, Ft. Pierce, Fla. (Reedley College/Port St. Lucie). Wasted little in making an immediate impact in his

lone year at the Reedley, Calif., school, accumulating first-team All-America accolades.

HIGH SCHOOL

Justin Andrews, LB, 6-2, 206, San Pedro, Calif. (SPHS). The two-year starter acquired first-team all-Marine League honors his junior and senior seasons as a defensive end standout.

Nuvraj Bassi, DL, 6-6, 242, Surrey, British Columbia (North Delta). Proved to be an overpowering force on both sides of the ball for the Huskies during 1999 and 2000.

Randall Bowen, DL, 6-2, 288, Compton, Calif. (Dominguez). The all-CIF defender garnered Best in the West honorable mention by the Long Beach Press-Telegram.

Kellen Clemens, QB, 6-2, 193, Burns, Ore. (BHS). One of the most decorated players on the West Coast reigned as the only player in the state to attract Parade All-America attention.

Tim Day, DL/TE, 6-3, 248, Las Vegas, Nev. (Western). The two-year starter and team

captain excelled as a defensive end and tight end for the Warriors a year ago after starring as an offensive guard during 1999.

Phillip Goodman, ATH, 6-2, 208, Vallejo, Calif. (VHS). Demonstrated all the natural athletic skills in high school to develop into a physical receiving threat.

Devan Long, DL, 6-3, 236, Anacortes, Wash. (AHS). The three-year letterman and two-year starter garnered first-team all-Northwest League acclaim as a wingback and inside linebacker his senior season.

A.J. Mitz, DL, 6-3, 250, Renton, Wash. (Kentwood). Helped Conquerors reach the state semifinals as a nose tackle the last two years after migrating from Fort Pierce, Fla., scoring first-team all-state acclaim by the Associated Press and Seattle Times.

Jason Mohamed, OL, 6-3, 261, Rialto, Calif. (Fontana). The two-time all-Citrus Belt League offensive tackle secured honors as the Steelers' most valuable offensive lineman.

Justin Phinisee, CB, 5-11, 178, Downey,

Calif. (DHS). Thrived as an all-around athletic standout to become program's first Pac-10 signee directly out of high school.

Ramone Reed, LB, 6-2, 190, Richmond, Calif. (Berkeley). Garnered acclaim on both sides of the football for the Alameda Contra Costa Athletic League co-championships.

Ian Reynoso, OL, 6-4, 277, Seal Beach, Calif. (Los Alamitos). The two-time first-team all-Orange County prospect and Long Beach Press-Telegram Dream Team honoree is projected as one of the Western Region's top 11 prep offensive linemen.

Demetrius Spates, CB, 5-11, 185, Ocean-side, Calif. (El Camino). Transformed outstanding athletic skills to become the first sophomore ever to start at quarterback in prep head coach Herb Meyer's 42-year head coaching tenure.

Robby Valenzuela, DL, 6-1, 277, Manteca, Calif. (Grace M. Davis). The Stanislaus District player of the year was recognized as one of the most dominant defensive linemen on the West Coast.

Terrance Whitehead, S/WR, 5-10, 199, Los Angeles, Calif. (Crenshaw). Was rated by one recruiting publication among the top 100 high school players in the country.

Demetrius Williams, WR, 6-1, 162, Pittsburg, Calif. (De La Salle). The SuperPrep All-American not only ranks among the top recruits in this year's class in the state, his status as a unanimous Long Beach Press-Telegram Best in the West selection represents the Ducks' first such signee since the list was first put together 25 years ago.

Mike Willis, WR, 5-11, 155, Long Beach, Calif. (Poly). Unable to attract as much attention as others with comparable talents due to spending only one season in the Poly system, yet evaluators were impressed with his 4.3 speed and rapidly developing physical skills.

Roderkus Wright, DL, 6-4, 250, San Diego, Calif. (SDHS). Earned Harbor League defensive player-of-the-year accolades and all-San Diego County tribute in his lone football campaign on the West Coast.

last season. Siavii, a 6-foot-5, 335-pound defensive tackle is expected to step right in and help fill some of the holes left by departed seniors.

"Junior's not the right name, he is a big young man," Bellotti said. "He looks awesome on film, and is a great player that will really provide a good push up the middle."

Bellotti referenced the importance of the linebacker position after Michael Callier's career is "potentially" over after his appeal for an extra year of eligibility was de-

nied by the NCAA earlier this week.

"Justin Andrews (6-2, 206) and Ramone Reed (6-2, 190) are two really good linebackers that can provide athleticism and speed, and can play inside or outside," Bellotti said. "I think they will make up for, potentially, the loss of Michael."

On the offensive side of the ball, Oregon officially announced the signing of quarterback Kellen Clemens of Burns, who made his decision to be a Duck back on June 25. The 6-2, 193-pounder was ranked as the third-best high school quarterback in the nation by Prep-Star.

"Kellen's an exceptional young

man with great leadership and the ability to lift the play of people around him," Bellotti said. "He can throw any type of ball and is a perfect fit. He continues the great tradition of quarterbacks at Oregon."

Oregon had to recruit with a shortened staff after a few assistant coaches left for higher profile jobs at other schools.

"Our six coaches did a fantastic job at covering the country and keeping the ship afloat, and finding and turning several kids that are key people for us," Bellotti said.

Bellotti said that he had reached an agreement with a tight ends/special teams coach, but couldn't an-

nounce who it was yet as this coach was still under contract.

There was speculation that Bellotti's interview for the Ohio State vacancy in January may hurt recruiting, but Bellotti said that it turned out to be positive.

"I think ultimately it was a tremendous benefit," he said. "The recognition that came to our program, and the fact that other institutions in the nation were interested in hiring me and many of my staff, was a huge factor in our recruiting."

The exhausting process still is not complete, as players have until April 1 to sign letters of intent. Al-

though most recruits signed Wednesday with their respective teams, Bellotti said that he's still waiting on "two or three people."

Oregon recruited heavily in California, where 15 of the new recruits hail from. Clemens is the only Oregon recruit, while the Ducks brought in two from Washington. Overall, Bellotti is "proud" of the group he's assembled and looks forward to seeing how they will mix with the returning corps.

"The combination of the successful [10-2] season and the tremendously successful recruiting season bodes very well for the future of Oregon," Bellotti said.






