Twins continue to sizzle with win against Yankees

MINNEAPOLIS — Doug Mientkiewicz had just finished telling reporters about how the Minnesota Twins are a team without any individual stars.

"No, I take that back," he said, glancing at Brad Radke across the room. "He's our superstar."

Mientkiewicz's tiebreaking home run in the seventh inning gave Radke and the Twins a 2-1 victory over the New York Yankees Monday night.

Radke (5-0) pitched his second complete game of the season and became the first five-game winner in the major leagues by outdueling Andy Pettitte.

Radke allowed six hits, including Tino Martinez's home run in the fourth, struck out four and walked one. He became the first pitcher in franchise history to start a season 5-0 since the Washington Senators' Walter Johnson did it in 1913.

"It's always nice to beat the champs," said Radke. "I didn't really want to mess that game up."

Men take eighth at Pac-10s

■ Certain individuals have solid rounds, but the Duck golfers finish eighth as a team at the league tourney

Like a light bulb that flickers on and off before going completely out, the No. 20 Oregon men's golf team may have officially thrown the switch off on the 2000-01 season this weekend.

At the very least, the Ducks need to throw in a new bulb before the NCAA West Regionals in three weeks.

Oregon finished eighth at the Pacific-10 Conference Champi-

onships in Palo Alto, Calif., over the weekend. The Ducks ended the tournament with their best round, a combined 351, to secure eighth place.

The story of the tournament for Oregon was the play of Aaron Byers and John Ellis. Byers' 68 in the first round carried him through to the final day, and he ended in 12th overall. Ellis' standout round came on the last day when he shot a 69 to end up in 19th.

The story of the tournament was the pack of teams that finished around Oregon and the even tighter race for first. While the Ducks finished eighth, they ended up only 10 strokes behind the fifth-place team, No. 38 UCLA. Sixth-place and No. 41 Stanford was only two

strokes ahead of Oregon, while seventh-place Washington State finished a mere stroke ahead of the Ducks.

At the top of the team race, No. 6 Southern California stunned the field to take first by four strokes over No. 4 Arizona State. The Trojans' win broke the Sun Devils' streak of six straight Pac-10 crowns.

No. 18 Arizona finished third, four strokes behind Arizona State, while No. 29 Washington finished fourth overall.

The Ducks will continue their postseason run at the NCAA West Regionals in Corvallis May 17-19. If Oregon does well at Regionals, it will travel to the NCAA Championships later this month.

Spurs advance to second round

MINNEAPOLIS — The San Antonio Spurs needed more than their Twin Towers to eliminate the Minnesota Timberwolves from their first-round series Monday night.

Tim Duncan scored 24 and David Robinson added 21 in the 97-84 victory, but timely three-pointers by Danny Ferry and Antonio Daniels put the Spurs over the top.

Duncan was just 8-of-23 from the field, and Robinson went to the bench with his fourth foul in the third period. Ferry and Daniels hit four three-pointers apiece to prove that these Spurs are more than a two-man show.

"We've ridden on Timmy's back all season," Ferry said. "When teams double-team him, we have other guys who can shoot the ball."

The Spurs, 3-1 winners of the series, also knocked the Wolves out of the first round in 1999, before going on to win the NBA title. They will play the winner of the Dallas-Utah series.

"It doesn't matter who we play," said Duncan, who also had 16 rebounds. "You can say that, and sometimes it does matter. This time, it really doesn't. If Dallas comes back, that could take a lot of them. Utah would be fine, too."

The Wolves lost in the first round for the fifth time. Their 0-5 series

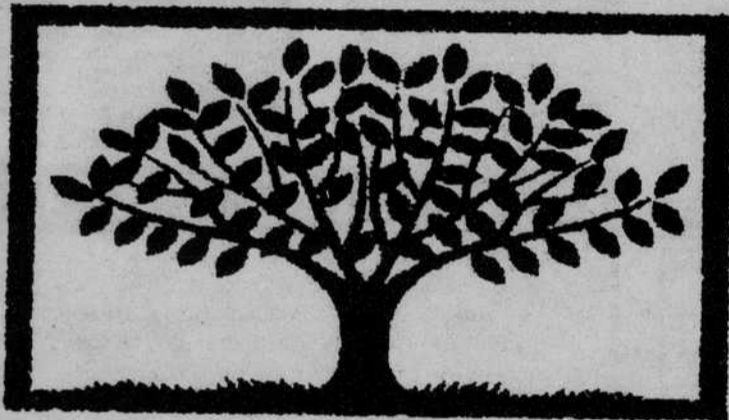
record in the playoffs is the worst among all NBA franchises.

"It's getting pretty old," Timberwolves guard Terrell Brandon said. "The fans want something else to happen, and they deserve it."

Robinson came up with a pair of big baskets after Minnesota's Brandon and Anthony Peeler, both scoreless in the first half, hit back-to-back three-pointers with less than six minutes left to make it 75-73.

"There was a tough stretch where we got into a slump there," said Robinson, who had 14 rebounds. "Coming back down the floor, I felt pretty good so I put them up there. Finishing out this game means so much to me."

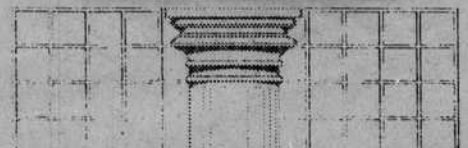
