Runge's coaching methods, communication skills and reportedly asked that she be fired.

"I have never been talked to about what was said at that meeting," Runge said.

Moos hired Bond, Schoeneck & King on March 27. After 30 days of investigation — which included more than 80 interviews of players, former players, coaches and administrators — the firm handed in its report April 27.

Roberts said reports suggesting that the 30-page report from Bond, Schoeneck & King, a law firm nationally recognized for handling

troubled athletic programs, had anything to do with her resignation "is flat out not true."

"The process of these last eight weeks and the events that transpired led to her conclusion," Roberts said. "The fact that [the Athletic Department] needed to do this report and not do it internally was a part of her decision, not the results of the report."

Runge was scheduled to meet with Moos on Friday to discuss the report, but the meeting was canceled after Runge began planning her "exit strategy," Moos said.

Runge and Roberts would not discuss details of the report.

The University is still processing the report and it was unclear at Monday's briefing if and when it

would be made public. Many requests have been made and University spokeswoman Pauline Austin said the document could be available sometime next week.

"The report will be available, but not in full," Austin said. "Every bit of information that can be made public will be made public."

Runge said she has no idea what she will do now.

Roberts said the 38-year-old Kentucky native is "in very good spirits."

"She's just trying to catch her breath right now," Roberts said. "She's taking some time and trying to decide what she's going to do now. She's not hiding at home with a bag over her head."

"She's relieved it's over."

Malone and Mary Etter, who are top-five in the javelin and discus, respectively, but the NCAA marks thin out from there. Niki Reed is eighth nationally in the pole vault and Holly Speight joins her on the provisional list. Only one runner, senior Hanna Smedstad in the 10,000, has scored an NCAA provisional time. Oregon needs to catch up, and quickly.

6. **Stanford.** The Cardinal does

one event, the 5,000 meters, better than anyone in the country. Stanford athletes are first, 20th, 21st, 27th, 34th and 46th nationally in that race.

7. **Washington State.** The Cougars may surprise some teams before the season is out. WSU has a variety of NCAA provisional marks, but only one that should turn heads: Whitney Evans' 6-0 1/2 in the high jump.

8. **Washington.** The Huskies have a strong sprint corps, anchored by Anna Aoki and Kate Bradshaw in the 5,000 and 10,000, respectively.

The Ducks found that out the hard way at the Washington Dual at Hayward Field on April 14.

9. **California.** The Golden Bears don't go very deep, don't score very good marks even at the top and will struggle to make any noise in the postseason.

So, while the NBA playoffs heat up and the NHL Stanley Cup swings into action, the Oregon women's track and field team will shoot for the national stars soon. But the Pac-10 stars may get in the way first.

cording to the Trackwire.com national rankings. Defending national champion Stanford was the highest ranked team in the conference at No. 9. Washington was the only other top-15 team at No. 12. Oregon and USC rounded out the Pac-10 field at 20th and 21st, respectively.

Texas and the South Eastern Conference swept the top-10, with Texas Christian getting the top nod and SEC teams ranking two through eight. Texas, UTEP, Texas A&M, Baylor and Southern Methodist occupied the remaining top-15 spots.

in the Pac-10 form chart this week. If the Pac-10 meet were held today and were based on season bests, the Trojans would run away from the field with 142 points. The Cardinal would finish second with 117, with UCLA not far behind. Rounding out the list would be Arizona State, Oregon, California, Arizona, Washington and Washington State.
