Lemieux, Penguins force a seventh game

PITTSBURGH — Mario Lemieux never seems to run out of ways to save the Pittsburgh Penguins.

Martin Straka scored in overtime after Lemieux's dramatic goal with 1:18 left in regulation kept Pittsburgh's season alive, and the Penguins beat the Buffalo Sabres 3-2 Tuesday night to force a seventh game.

"Mario did it again," Straka said.

The Sabres, less than 90 seconds away from reaching the Eastern Conference finals for the third time in four years, now must win a Game 7 Thursday in Buffalo to keep their own season going.

Straka also won the decisive Game 6 of the first round against Washington with an overtime goal — the last home game Pittsburgh won before its come-from-behind victory Tuesday.

Robert Lang banged Dimitri Kalinin off the puck along the rear boards, allowing Alexei Kovalev to throw it out front to Straka, who buried it past Dominik Hasek for his third of the playoffs at 11:29 of overtime. It prevented Pittsburgh's third consecutive second-round elimination in a Game 6 home game and its second in a row after winning the first two games on the road.

"Lang forced the play and Kovvy found me and I was wide open," Straka said. "I just wanted to hit the net. I

didn't even think about it. In overtime, you have to keep getting the puck on the net and try to get lucky."

This time, the Sabres didn't as they lost in overtime for the first time in these playoffs after beating Philadelphia twice in the first round and Pittsburgh in Game 5.

Donald Audette put Buffalo ahead 2-1 at 16:12 of the second period and Hasek, trying to steal a game for the first time in the series, almost made it hold up even as Pittsburgh outshot the Sabres 33-18.

But with the Penguins' season ticking away, Lemieux, who hadn't scored since the opening goal of Game 1, tied it with his 76th career playoff goal — and, certainly, one of his most dramatic.

Only 15 seconds after goalie Johan Hedberg was pulled to give Pittsburgh an extra attacker, Kovalev's shot rebounded off Curtis Brown's skate and landed near the crease.

Lemieux, at the left of the net, whacked at it once, then twice, finally sliding it by Hasek for his sixth goal of the playoffs — extending a season that seemed to be all but over for Pittsburgh.

"Hasek didn't see it at all. I just whacked it in," Lemieux said.

The rigors of competition in the Pac-10 have seemingly always bruised the Ducks — and many other teams in the league — but head coach Rick Gamez's squad has typically found ways of winning outside the conference.

And in both games against Portland State, the Ducks went into the bottom of the seventh with at least a tie and appeared, at least in the nightcap, to have a victory in hand. In both games, though, Oregon lost in the final at-bat.

"It's extremely disappointing," Gamez said after the losses. "You figure that if you're up by three runs that that would be plenty, but..."

Enter Kiauna Anderson.

The 5-foot-5 left fielder is just one-ninth of the Vikings' starting

squad, but proved to be anything but one-dimensional against the Ducks.

After winning the first game with a walk-off, two-run home run — just the second of her career — Anderson stole a homer on a leaping catch at the wall in left, hit another bomb and scored the game-winning run in the second contest.

In defeat, Triawn Custer and Vidlund each hit two home runs on the day.

The sweep was Portland State's first against Oregon in 10 years. The Vikings have not won a season series over the Ducks since 1985.

Since the April 3 meeting with the Vikings, the Ducks are 4-15, with all four wins coming against non-conference opponents.

"If we get a couple wins [today] we should be better off this weekend for Cal and Stanford," Vidlund said. "You always try to play as hard as you can and when you play outside of the Pac-10, it gets you ready for the Pac-10 games, which count the most."

Oregon hosts No. 5 California Friday and No. 3 Stanford Saturday to end the regular season.
