Union hosts annual Powwow

The Native American Student Union is putting on its 33rd annual Powwow at McArthur Court this weekend. The event will run all day Saturday and Sunday.

Grand entry times — when dancing begins — will be at noon and 7 p.m. on Saturday, and at noon on Sunday. Admission is free.

University School of Law

to hold graduations Sunday

About 150 graduates will receive their diplomas Sunday at the commencement ceremonies for the 2001 graduating class of the University School of Law.

The ceremony, held at the Silva Concert Hall at the Hult Center for the Performing Arts, is free to the public. Seating will begin at noon, with the ceremony beginning at 1 p.m.

A reception for the graduates will follow at the William H. Knight Law Center. This year's graduates will hear speeches from both law school professors and Christine Connelly, president of the Student Bar Association.

Rennard Strickland, dean of the law school, said this year's class is outstanding, and offered some advice to the graduates.

"Study for the bar [exam]," he said. "And remember, commencement doesn't end your learning process. It's just the beginning of it."

Strickland recently won the Haywood Burns Award from the Northeast People of Color Conference for his involvement in legal education and diversity interests,

particularly for helping Native American students to attend law school.

Frohnmayr surprises professors with apples

Three University professors received awards this week honoring their exemplary teaching.

University President Dave Frohnmayr made a surprise visit to each professor's class Wednesday and Thursday to hand-deliver crystal apple awards to East Asian studies professor Stephen Durrant, assistant Spanish professor David Castillo and assistant English professor Lisa Freinkel.

Durrant was presented with the Herman Award, which honors a senior faculty member who demonstrates outstanding classroom ability. Castillo and Freinkel both were given Ersted Awards, which recognize the efforts of junior faculty members.

In addition to the crystal apple prize, each professor received a \$2,000 stipend.

"First I was shocked, then I kind of came to my senses," Castillo said of his reaction to Frohnmayr stopping in his class with a group of television cameras in tow.

"I'm extremely thrilled with the award," he said. "It's very fulfilling."

Frohnmayr said in a statement that "this year's honorees are widely respected and admired by their students and peers."

Castillo said the award honors his entire department, as well as the students who are integral to the high level of quality he said his department enjoys.

"I consider myself extremely lucky to work with a group of colleagues and students who make my job extremely easy," he said.
