The Ducks brought down 56 rebounds and only had 17 turnovers, both large improvements on recent problems. And after shooting 48.5 percent in the first half and finishing at 44.3 percent on the night, everything was going in their favor.

Oregon was led by Davis with 19 points and 11 rebounds. Davis took over the starting position for senior Shaquala Williams, who was not present Thursday.

Steen had a solid night off the bench for the Ducks with 12 points and three assists, while junior Cathrine Kraayeveld brought down 12 boards and had three blocks.

"It felt very good, this team has come together quite a bit, and we really wanted this one tonight," Steen said. "I think we did everything we could to make that happen.

The Pilots were led by forward Michaela Dalgleish who accounted for 16 points on three from downtown in her 29 minutes. As a team, Portland was 35.9 percent from the floor, but had only 31 rebounds.

From here, the Ducks travel to Portland on Saturday for the Papé Jam where they face No. 19 Brigham Young (3-0).

The Ducks and Cougars met at the Marriott Center in 2001, when BYU's outside arsenal could not be matched, as Oregon suffered a 74-58 loss, ending a three-game winning streak.

Oregon (2-3) leads the series with BYU at 6-2 and prior to last year's loss, the Ducks had won six



In place of Williams, Smith rotated players in Oregon's backcourt often. Davis led the guards with 28 minutes played, followed by junior Kayla Steen's 25 minutes. Edwards was on the floor for 24 while senior Kourtney Shreve played a season-high 13 minutes and responded with six points, her first points of the season.

Edwards will again run the offense against Brigham Young when the Ducks travel to Portland on Saturday for the Papé Jam at the Rose Garden. Smith said she and Williams have a scheduled meeting, but have not discussed the suspension much since it was announced during preparation for the game against Portland.

Smith declined to go into further detail regarding the situation, and said, "I have no anticipation of where we're going right now."
