Orange Bowl has Rose-like appeal, teams

The Jan. 2 BCS bowl will host the Big Ten and Pacific-10 Conference co-champions

Freelance Sports Reporter This year, the Orange Bowl might want to request a name change.

The Rose Bowl is supposed to feature the Big Ten and Pacific-10 Conference champions every year, but it's the Orange Bowl that pits No. 3 Iowa against No. 5 USC, both co-champions in their respective conferences.

The teams will face off in Miami in the only bowl game played on Jan. 2. The 5 p.m. game, played at Pro Player Stadium, will be shown on ABC.

The Big Ten's co-champion, No. 2 Ohio State, will play in the national title game, while the Pac-10's cochampion, No. 7 Washington State, will play in the Rose Bowl.

Iowa and USC have met eight times, with USC leading the series 6-2. The most recent matchup resulted in a 55-0 USC victory in 1976. Iowa and USC have never met in a bowl game.

Iowa started its 2002 campaign strong, winning two games before losing to rival Iowa State. The Hawkeyes lost a disappointing game to the Cyclones, 36-31.

Iowa came back and won out the season, finishing 8-0 in Big Ten conference play and 11-1 overall. The Hawkeyes dominated opponents throughout the season, outscoring opponents by an average of 23 points in their 11 wins.

Senior Brad Banks will lead his Hawkeye teammates against a USC defense that is holding its opponents to an average of 19 points per game. Banks is one of the top candidates for the Heisman Trophy and has the second-highest quarterback rating in the nation.

USC started its season in similar fashion to the Hawkeyes. The Trojans won their first two games of the season before dropping one. USC suffered a 27-20 loss to Kansas State, then two weeks later earned the only other blemish on the Trojans 7-1 Pac-10 and 10-2 overall

record, with a 30-27 loss in overtime to Washington State.

USC won out its season, outscoring opponents by an average of 21 points in 10 wins. Redshirt senior Carson Palmer has the seventhbest quarterback rating in the nation and second-best in the Pac-10.

Without having faced each other in 26 years, both teams are stepping onto new territory. Rose-less territory, at that.

Oregon's senior class this year is diverse, with some only in their second year with the team and others in their fifth.



And with the Seattle Bowl in just three weeks, some are ready for bigger and better things.


