
#### World's best comes for 5,000

Kenya's Benjamin Limo, the top-



### **Dragila file**

Born: Stacy Dragila on March 25, 1971, in Auburn, Calif.

College: In two years at Yuba College, she focused on the heptathlon. Spent junior and senior years at Idaho State University where she learned the pole vault and graduated in 1995.

After college: Won first Olympic gold medal at 2000 games in Sydney. Became the first woman to ever win the world indoor championships in 1997, equaling the world record of 14-5 3/4. In 1999 at the IAAF World Outdoor Championships, in Seville, became the first woman ever to win

pole vault outdoor title by equaling the world record of 15-1. In 2000, Dragila broke the American record four times, and the world indoor record on three occasions.

The battle between college prodigy and world's best must wait.

Meanwhile, Dragila will try to break her own records at 1 p.m. Saturday.

But the two could soon compete at the highest level if the cards fall right.

"In 2004, to travel with her to Athens ... I think the two of us could be there," Holliday said of the next Olympics in Greece. "That's what I want, Stacy's probably going to go, and it's a matter of who's next in line — and hopefully I'll be that one."
