In this year's graduating class, women lead the charge, with 2,241 graduates compared to 1,787 men. There is also diversity in age, culture and background. The youngest student receiving an undergraduate degree is 19 years old while the oldest is 67.

In the graduate category, the youngest student is 22 and the oldest is 60 years old. There are students from 49 states and 49 countries. Out of the many who will march to pomp and circumstance, 396 identify as ethnic minorities, and 381 are international students.


