"After Teddy got his second attempt at 6-11, his chances were looking pretty good," Lindsey said, "so I couldn't let him go to NCAA's alone."

Prior to Friday, Davis' one 7-foot clearance for Oregon came during his collegiate indoor opener in January 2003 (7-0 1/4).

Other qualifiers in the high jump included event-winner Wilburn (7-2 1/4), Southern California's Jesse Williams (7-1, fewer misses) and Long Beach State's John Temidara (fifth, 6-11).

All-Academic men

The Oregon men claimed a conference-high and school-best five first-team selections to the Pacific-10 Conference All-Academic team.

Redshirt seniors Ryan Andrus (3.94, business administration) and Gabriel LeMay (3.77, biology), senior Trevor Woods (3.74, business administration) and sophomores Matt Scherer (3.74, business administration) and Andy Young (3.76, exercise and movement science) were praised with first-team honors for the Ducks.

Andrus has collected three such honors in track and cross country, while Woods and Young received

their second consecutive first-team track honors.

Second team picks included redshirt junior Eric Logsdon (3.27, business administration) and Davis (3.54, undeclared), while junior Brett Holts and freshman David Moore took home honorable mention honors.

All-Academic women

The Oregon women's track team also proved to be a smart bunch. Of the Ducks' 28-person roster, only 18 were eligible for outdoor honors, meaning an athlete is a redshirt freshman or older and is in her second year with the same university. Of the 18 eligible athletes, 11 qualified for honors with a 3.0 GPA or higher.

Oregon's first-team honorees included seniors Kirsten Larwin (3.89, French) and Erinn Gulbrandsen (3.73, English) and second-team honors were awarded to sophomores Whitney Gum (3.51, biology) and redshirt sophomore Sara Schaaf (3.49, mathematics).

Honorable mention accolades were given to senior Jill Hoxmeier, redshirt juniors Taylor Bryant, Laura Harmon and Magdalena Sandoval, juniors Michelle Donovan and Kayla Mellott and redshirt sophomore Haripurkh Khalsa.

Williams sisters' twin losses cause forfeit of French Open

The sisters were upset on the same day in the same tournament; a first for the two stars professionally

PARIS — No more giggly press conferences. No more reports on famous people met at the Cannes Film Festival. And no more simply fascinating ruminations about the exact colors of their tennis outfits.

Serena and Venus Williams are out of the French Open. Both of them. On the same day, in the same quarterfinal round, in the same tournament for the first time since they were both professionals, beginning in 1995, and these twin losses probably mark the end of their days of domination of the WTA Tour.

That doesn't mean there aren't more Grand Slam titles in those murderously powerful right arms, and particularly at Wimbledon, which is coming up in 19 days. But there is too much talent on the women's tour now for any one player to scorch the field.

On a drippy Tuesday where the start of play was delayed by 21 minutes and interrupted by three further rain stoppages, Serena lost to Jennifer Capriati's new, killer finishing touch, 6-3, 2-6, 6-3. Venus, looking alternately distracted and disinterested, was beaten by Anastasia Myskina

of Russia 6-3, 6-4.

In the top half of the draw, ninth-seeded Elena Dementieva joined her Russian compatriot Myskina in the semifinals by upsetting No. 3 Amelie Mauresmo of France 6-4, 6-3 and Paola Suarez, the forgotten Argentinian.

tine, ended the run of a third Russian, Maria Sharapova, 6-1, 6-3.

But the importance of those matches was greatly overshadowed by the astonishing Williams defeats. It's been four years since Serena and Venus Williams have been double-Grand Slammed out of a major before the semifinals.

"I just had a bad day with the serve," Serena said after popping five double faults, four in the third set and two in a row in the crucial fourth game, in which Capriati broke to go up 3-1. "And I don't think I got any first serves in," she added. She was, of course, exaggerating. But 39 percent first serves during the third set was certainly a factor in her loss.

A bigger factor, however, was Capriati, who rebounded from a

horrible second set in which she didn't stroke a winner, to play with fire and nerve down the stretch.

Williams had broken back immediately to 3-2 before Capriati cracked her a second time to take a 5-3 lead.

At 30-40, Williams had to hit another second serve and Capriati stepped inside the baseline, edged over so far her left foot was resting on the singles sideline tape, and when Serena put the serve in her strike zone, Capriati crashed an inside-out forehand that Williams could only pop up.

Capriati quickly closed on the net and slugged the high volley winner for the break, then served out the match at 40-30, though only after a near controversy.

Capriati's ground stroke on the baseline on match point was called out by a linesman and overruled by chair umpire Pascal Maria of France after Williams stroked the ball back into the net.

Capriati thought she had won the match and began to rejoice when Maria ordered a replay. No problem and no argument. She ended it this time with a running forehand that Williams netted.

"I'm just so happy and relieved," Capriati said. "I looked up at my parents and I was like, 'It's about time one of these went my way for once.'"

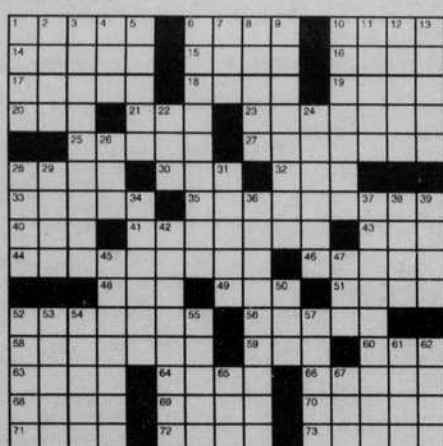
