Top American sprinter Maurice Greene, who took second in the men's 100-meter dash, said track and field needs days like Saturday to take the focus off the steroid controversy.

"This is what it's all about," Greene said. "For the fans in the stands. If it wasn't for them, there wouldn't be a meet for us." There is no doubt that a negative image is being associated with track and field around one of the most important times in the sport: The United States Olympic Trials

begin at Sacramento in three weeks.

Jones, who is at the center of the controversy, is arguably the most popular women's track athlete of all time. When reporters met with the three-time Olympic gold medalist, eight of the 11 questions asked during the six-minute interview dealt with the drug scandal.

"Off the track, it's definitely affecting me," Jones said. "But in terms of my training and my competing ... I think I'm doing as well as can be done. I'm trying to stay as focused as possible. I'm hopeful that I'll be competing in Sacramento and give everybody a run for their money and make my second

Olympic team and then be in Athens."

With the Summer Olympics right around the corner, it is necessary the several dozen athletes under investigation and USADA find a solution. If not, questions will linger around the results of what should be a true test of the world's best athletes.

How long will this drug scandal last until it is resolved?

"I see it going through the Trials and probably right up to the Games," Jones said.

What a shame.

students," DuFour said.

Housing standards, or Eugene's lack thereof, has long been a focus of ASUO efforts and is "one of the campaigns in which strong voter registration is really the key, because [city councilors] need to know that we can affect their positions," Petkun said.

The administration hopes that a strong voter-registration drive will

lead to a strong housing standards campaign and a greater student awareness of ASUO, Petkun said.

Most pressing on the publicity agenda is the need for a functioning Web site where students can go for information about ASUO projects, Public Relations Director Nathan Strauss said. "Through that I think we can build sort of a plan to publicize ASUO," he added.

Once positions are filled and project plans are organized and finalized, the administration can begin building

momentum for the year, Petkun said. "The more work we put in now the easier it's going to be for everyone and the more effective we can be for the rest of the year."

ASUO Vice President Mena Ravasipour said she feels the ASUO staff is organized.

"We're looking forward to making things happen and working together," she said.
