Clarett said when he said he denied these allegations in the past, he was protecting his coach and his teammates from suspensions.

This is coming from a guy who said he had \$10,000 worth of clothing, CDs, cash and stereo equipment stolen from his 2001 Chevrolet Monte Carlo when in fact the car was borrowed, the equipment was the dealer's and Clarett had overestimated the cost of the equipment. The charge against him had a maximum penalty of \$1,000 and six months in jail for lying on a police report.

He pleaded guilty to a lesser charge — failure to aid a law enforcement officer — and paid the maximum fine of \$100 on the charge, received no jail time and it doesn't appear on his record.

He blew off a meeting with NFL Hall of Fame running back Marcus Allen his high school football coach set up for him.

Clarett's past is foggy and for him to say he wants to "clear his name" with the NFL owners and general managers is nothing more than self preservation.

Sophomore setter Courtney Thompson was accredited with 73 of the 79 assists Washington recorded against its intrastate rival. Thompson's top performance came against Oregon State on Oct. 28 when she tallied 78 assists, the best of any setter in the league this season.

Arizona State and Oregon will play their last home matches this week. The Sun Devils host the Washington schools in Tempe, Ariz., and the Ducks will have the Bay Area teams in town. Arizona State ended a five-game losing streak by sweeping Oregon last week.

OSU sets team, personal highs

Allison Lawrence reached the 20/20 mark for the first time in her career

against Arizona State with 22 kills and 21 digs. The senior outside hitter has recorded 13 double-doubles this season. She is No. 6 in the Pac-10 with 3.89 kills per game.

Freshman libero Nina Baltimore posted a career-best 28 digs against the Sun Devils. As a team, the Beavers collected a season-high 92 digs.

Oregon State (10-12, 4-9) saw its miniature winning streak of two matches end in a defeat to then-No. 22 Arizona on Friday.
