#### Oregon gears up for Civil War dual at Mac Court


Oregon (5-9 overall, 2-5 Pacific-10) has a chance to break even with Oregon State (9-8-1, 4-2-1) Sunday when the two wrestle in a Civil War dual at McArthur Court at 2 p.m. Earlier in the season, the two schools faced each other in Corvallis where the Beavers walked away the victor, 22-13.

Sunday promises to be a close match, considering that these two teams look almost identical on paper. Several weight-classes feature wrestlers who have faced each other in the past, including the 125-pound match where Duck Joey Lucas faces Eric Stevenson. Stevenson has held the upper hand in matches against Lucas, winning three out of their last four meetings.

The key matchup in this dual is in the 165-pound division, where No. 18 Dan Ellis of Oregon State squares off against No. 17 Joey Bracamonte. In their only previous meeting, Ellis defeated Bracamonte 1-0 at last season's Best of the West tournament hosted by Southern Oregon.

Last week, the Ducks traveled to Oklahoma, where they faced No. 6 Oklahoma and No.1 Oklahoma State. Bracamonte recorded Oregon's only win in their 46-4 loss at the hands of the Cowboys. Oklahoma State, the defending NCAA champion, dominated the Ducks by recording nine victories with five of them coming by way of a pin. In the previous day, Oregon came up short of the Sooners, who won by a narrow 30-22 margin. The Beavers traveled to the panhandle state as well and did not fare much better - they fell in similar fashion 35-6 to Oklahoma and 40-4 to Oklahoma State.

# Men: Ducks connect on only 33 of 54 free-throw attempts

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Kent said the key to dealing with Washington's pressure defense was how much contact the officials were going to let the Huskies get away with.

Kent's prediction was dead on as Thursday's officials let Washington get away with next to nothing. The Ducks shot a school-record 54 free throws - breaking the record of 51

attempts - as the Huskies were whistled for 36 fouls.

The slower pace and repeated trips to the charity stripe allowed Oregon to stay neck-and-neck with Washington the entire game.

The Ducks could view this game as a disappointment, as they connected on only 33 of 54 (61 percent) free-throw attempts, including 2 of 7 by Malik Hairston and 3 of 8 by Adam Zahn.

"It's very disappointing," Jordan Kent said. "We felt like there was no one to blame but us. We missed 21 free throws on the game, and there's absolutely no excuse for that.

Oregon entered the game shooting 67 percent from the foul line.

Kent's late misses overshadowed otherwise solid game from the gene native. The sophomore finished with a double-double, scoring 19 points and grabbing 16 rebounds.

The Ducks had four other players finish in double-figures: Aaron Brooks (15), Chamberlain Oguchi (13), Maarty Leunen (12) and Bryce Taylor (10).

Nate Robinson led Washington with 24 points, while Brandon Roy (18), Conroy (17), Bobby Jones (16) and Joel Smith (10) also reached double figures.

I hope this team continues to show this community what character is all about," Kent said. "To go through what they've been through and battle back (is impressive).

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
