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Utah's Bogut announces intent to enter NBA draft

The 7-foot Australia native averaged 20.4 points and 12.2 boards as he led the Utes to a 29-6 season

SALT LAKE CITY — Andrew Bogut couldn't pass up an opportunity to be the top pick in the NBA draft.

The Utah center announced Monday that he will forgo his final two years of eligibility to enter the draft, confirming what his coach, teammates and Utes fans have thought for a while.

"I have no regrets and full-speed ahead," the 7-footer from Australia said at a news conference Monday.

Bogut — the leading vote-getter on the AP All-America team — averaged 20.4 points and 12.2 rebounds while leading the Utes to a 29-6 season, which ended with a loss to Kentucky in the regional semifinals of the NCAA tournament.

"I feel the time is right to move on to the next level of basketball," Bogut said.

Bogut has already hired agent David Bauman of SFX Basketball, making him ineligible to play again in

college. Bogut plans to stick around Salt Lake City for a few weeks before heading to Washington, D.C., to begin preparing for pre-draft workouts.

Bogut considered leaving after last season when he was the Mountain West Conference freshman of the year, but a visit to Australia from new Utah coach Ray Giacoletti convinced Bogut to put off the NBA at least another year.

Bogut is expected to be — at the very least — a lottery pick and possibly the first player chosen overall. He led Utah in scoring and rebounding and is heralded as an exceptional ball handler and passer for a big man.

"There hasn't been one day when he hasn't been our hardest worker," Giacoletti said. "It's all been about the team, and that's very rare this day."

Bogut is the second Utah sports star to choose an early departure this year. Quarterback Alex Smith, a Heisman trophy finalist last season, announced in January that he would skip his senior season to play in the NFL. Smith is

also projected to go early in his draft, possibly as the No. 1 pick as well.

Bogut recorded double-doubles in all but nine games this season and finished with at least 10 points and 10 rebounds 40 times in his Utah career. At just 20 years old, NBA scouts — fixtures at Utah games this season — are convinced he can only get better.

Bogut was a starter on Australia's Olympic team last summer and averaged 14.8 points and 8.8 rebounds.

Bogut knew before the season started that leaving would be a possibility, but it wasn't until midway through it that he was really leaning toward the draft. However, he chose to keep quiet about it until the Utes' run in the NCAA tournament was over.

"I didn't want to do anything to take the limelight away from the team. It's just not fair," Bogut said.

Bogut was scheduled to join the Utes midway through the 2002-03 season, but had trouble getting cleared by the NCAA. While he could have gone pro right away in Europe or signed with another school because his commitment to Utah expired during the delay, Bogut kept his word, arriving in Salt Lake City in 2003.

place by shooting a final round 73, bringing her score to 218, and took the individual title by one stroke.

The Oregon men came out of the gate strong in the first two rounds of the tournament, but a weak final round left a top-five finish in jeopardy. Strong individual performances by sophomore Jay Snyder and juniors Gregg LaVoie and Chris Dukeminier carried the Ducks to a fifth place finish by carding a 71, 74 and 76 in the final round, respectively. Snyder's 71 marked a career low for the Vancouver, B.C., native.

He tied for 16th with a 2-over 218.

The team title for the men's Oregon Duck Invitational went to Washington, whose final round score of 284 gave the Huskies a six-stroke win over second place finishers Nevada and San Diego State. Second-ranked Georgia Tech finished fourth at 867, followed by the Ducks at 869.

Washington's James Lepp split the individual title with Michael Putnam of Pepperdine. Both finished at 8-under 208. Roberto Castro of Georgia Tech took third place. The Yellow Jacket carded a

three-round total of 210. He was followed by Ryan Panichpakdee of Long Beach State and Zach Bixler of Washington, who tied for fourth at 213. Matt Ma of Oregon recorded his second top-10 finish of the season as he tied with two other players for sixth place with 214.

The Oregon men are currently competing in the Western Invitational at Santa Cruz, Calif. The women play next at the Ping/ASU Invitational in Tempe, Ariz., where they are scheduled for three rounds April 1-2.
