Eric Mitchum wraps up busy weekend on road

Oregon hurdler Eric Mitchum finished pulling double-duty for the men's track and field team on Sunday.

The junior placed fifth overall in the 110-meter hurdles at the Mt. SAC Relays at Mt. San Antonio College in Walnut, Calif. — a day after capturing the 110-meter hurdles title at the Golden Bear Invitational in Berkeley, Calif.

Mitchum finished with a time of 13.56, capturing a season-best mark and the fourth-fastest wind-legal time of his career. His 13.56

was .16 seconds better than his victory at the Pepsi Invitational.

Sunday was Mitchum's third appearance at the Mt. SAC Relays, where he nearly eclipsed his time of 13.53 in last year's event.

The native of Calumet City, Ill., came into the weekend ranked third nationally with a time of 13.72, trailing only Antwon Hicks of Mississippi (13.68) and Linnie Yarbrough of Middle Tennessee State (13.70) on the year.

Mitchum's time on Sunday was behind only his times at last year's NCAA Championships, 13.38 in the finals and a 13.54 in the prelims, the Texas Relays (13.50) and last year's Mt. SAC relays.

uniform for Oregon. He has now breached the top 11 in five of the seven tournaments he has played in this year. Ma's teammates peppered the middle of the leaderboard. Junior Gregg LaVoie shot a 71 on Sunday to finish tied for 36th at 12 over 222. Other Oregon finishers included Jay Snyder (225), Justin St. Clair (226) and Chris Duke (227), who tied for 54th, 61st and 65th, respectively.

The hunt for the team title ended with a whimper rather than a bang as USC (846) left second-place finisher San Diego State trailing in the wake of a 17-stroke lead, giving the Trojans their first team crown of the season. The Aztecs finished at 863, edging them past a tightly packed bunch of the 18-team field. Fresno State followed in third at 867, leaving No. 15 UCLA (868) settling for fourth with a one-stroke lead over host Stanford (869), who rounded out the top five.

No. 10 Arizona State's Pat Moore finished three strokes below par in the final round, good enough for the individual title. His final score of 208 gave him a slight nod over Ma, who carded a 209.

Moore led the Sun Devils to a sixth-place finish at 872. Six strokes behind, the Ducks and Wildcats tied for seventh place with San Jose State (881) taking ninth and Washington (882) closing the top ten.

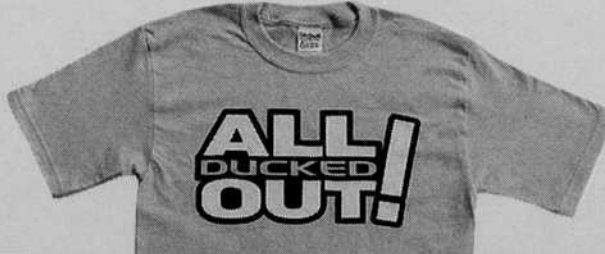
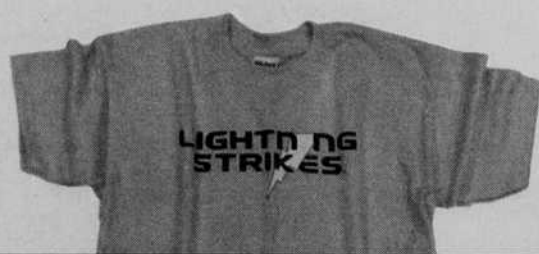
