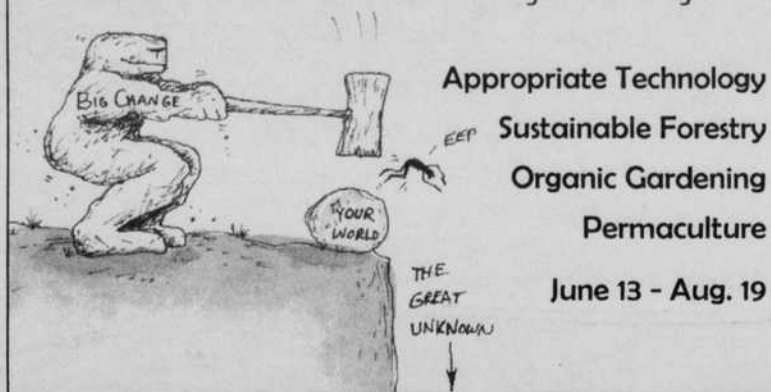

Speaker presents on society and policies of South Korea

Professor Hyuk-Rae Kim discussed the influence of non-governmental groups

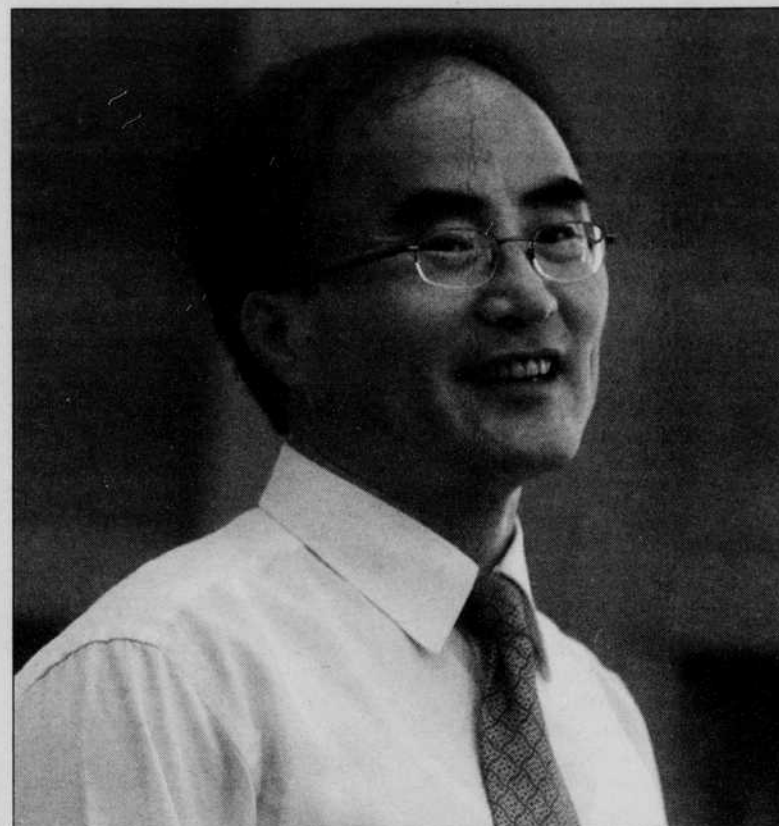
Professor of Korean Studies Hyuk-Rae Kim talked to students and community members in a speech titled "Shifting Power: From State-centric to Negotiated Governance in South Korea," which addressed many of the issues facing South Korea as it transitions to a negotiated governance during an era of rapid change and globalization.

"I want you to see the speed of change that South Korea has experienced in the past 30 to 40 years," Kim said during the speech in the Knight Library Thursday afternoon. "After the Korean War and Japanese occupation, social change in South Korea dramatically accelerated industrialization."

Kim visited the University from the Graduate School of International Studies at Yonsei University in Seoul, South Korea. He specializes in economic and social governance, civil society and methodology in South Korea.

Covering a wide range of topics, including the changes experienced in South Korea's demographics, economy and society over the past 40 years, Kim said that a hotly debated issue in South Korea is how to make a smooth transition to a civil society.

"Can we apply the concept of civil society — a concept developed in the west — to South Korea?" Kim said. "Civil society as a concept is problematic. If we want to use the

concept of civil society, we need to put it in into the context of capitalism. There's a hot debate over whether or not (South Korea) had capitalism in the 1800s. If we did, it's easy to say that the concept of civil society can be applied to South Korea."

Kim's lecture addressed Non-Governmental Organizations as a new development in South Korea in terms

of their impacts and social roles.

The NGOs in South Korea cover all aspects of social life and political activities. NGOs that address the environment, economic justice, human rights, legal advocacy, women's issues, education and school reform and consumerism are the most active.

Kim said that the rise of NGOs and
