Former Oregon women's basketball star Cathrine Kraayeveld has signed a contract to play for the WNBA's New York Liberty.

Kraayeveld, who earned first-team All-Pac-10 honors last season, was drafted in the third round by the San Antonio Silver Stars in April's WNBA Draft. Kraayeveld appeared in one pre-season game, scoring seven points and grabbing four rebounds, before being cut in May.

Currently fifth in the six-team Eastern Conference standings at 5-6, the Liberty have 22 regular season games remaining.

New York plays at the Los Angeles Sparks tonight at 7:30 p.m.

Tennis, basketball standouts earn medals

Sven Swinnen (tennis) and

Cathrine Kraayeveld (women's basketball) were named Pac-10 Conference medal winners for the University of Oregon.

Swinnen's senior season closed with the record of single-season (27) and career (84) victories, as well as earning All-America, first-team All-Pac-10 and first-team Pac-10 All-Academic honors.

Kraayeveld finished her senior season averaging 14.7 points and 8.3 rebounds per game, which ranked sixth and second in the Pac-10, respectively. She also ranked among the top 10 in nine of the league's 13 individual statistical categories.

According to Pac-10 Commissioner Tom Hansen, a conference medal is awarded annually to each member institution's outstanding senior male and female student-athlete based on the exhibition of the greatest combination of performance and achievement in scholarship, athletics and leadership.

The medal winners will be honored at the Pride of the Pac-10 luncheon held in Los Angeles, Calif., in

conjunction with the Pac-10 Men's Basketball Tournament in March.

Hayward hosts summer all-comers meets

Athletes 13 and older have an opportunity to compete in a weekly all-comers meet at Hayward Field every Thursday evening during the month of July.

Pole vault and high jump begin the competition at 5 p.m. Other events include the long jump, triple jump, shot put, javelin, discus, hammer, women's 100-meter hurdles, men's 110M hurdles, jogger's mile, 100M, 200M, 400M, 800M and 1,500M.

Ribbons will be awarded to top-five finishers, while results are grouped by divisions 13- and 14-year-olds, 15-16, 17-18, open (19-29), Sub-masters (30-39) and Masters (five year age divisions beginning at 40).

The cost is \$3 per athlete. Athletes are limited to three events, while Oregon Track Club junior members are eligible to compete for free. OTC senior members are charged \$1.

Kent: Various angles provide new insights

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"It was really watered-down," Kent said of the lifestyle in California. "There are so many areas of entertainment in town that we didn't really even register."

The Kents moved from California to Eugene in 1997 when Ernie received the head coaching position for the Ducks.

Painful decision

Kent's basketball career took a turn for the worse his senior year at Churchill High School.

In the third game of the season and with three minutes remaining in the first quarter against Elmira, Kent suffered a fracture in the gliding surface of his left femur and tore all of the cartilage in his left knee.

"I was on a fastbreak, went up for a dunk and got undercut," Kent said. "I was really frustrated because this was supposed to be this team's year."

Despite the loss of Kent for the season, it still was Churchill's year. The Lancers won the state championship with Kent watching from the bench.

"Basketball was going to be my vehicle in life," Kent said. "It really taught me how to watch the game and be more analytical of the game."

Kent was on crutches for nearly 12 weeks; during that time the basketball offers from various universities dried up. All except one.

"I was really lucky in the fact that my dad was in the position to let me walk on and redshirt for a year," Kent said.

Kent watched from the sidelines as the 2001-02 Oregon basketball team reached the Elite Eight in the NCAA Tournament. His time on the bench made him anxious to show

his potential on the court and then the unthinkable happened.

During a pick-up game of basketball at the recreation center, Kent tore the Anterior Cruciate Ligament in his right knee.

"I spent a year on the Elite Eight team, then turned around and served water to the team," Kent said, adding that it was a humbling experience.

"I don't know many young players that could humble themselves like that," Ernie Kent said. "To stay humbled and come through all of the adversity that he has come through ... it makes you feel proud as a dad."

Kent decided to give up playing basketball in college.

"I've had two serious knee surgeries," Kent said of his thoughts at the time. "I'd rather be able to walk and play with my grandkids 50 years from now than to try to play two more years of college ball."

Nearly a year to the date after the initial injury, the same ACL tear occurred during another pick-up game at the recreation center. Since then, the injury has happened one more time, after slipping on a linoleum floor on New Year's Eve of 2003.

"Anytime you see a kid suffer emotionally and physically it is painful," Ernie Kent said. "To his credit, even though his knees have not allowed him to play, he has found ways to stay involved in the game."

Kent is going in for surgery to receive a cadaver ACL on Thursday, a procedure that he hopes will relieve some pain.

"I've pretty much been told that I will have arthritis in both knees by the time I turn 30, so living without pain is basically out of the question," Kent said. "Hopefully I will be able to run around with my kids and grand-

kids without worrying about structural issues (of my knees)."

Watching from every angle

Kent has gone from playing on the court to watching from the bench to watching from the stands-as a member of the media and as a team manager-and will watch next year as an undergraduate manager.

"It has allowed me to view sports from so many different angles," Kent said. "I don't think there have been many people to see everything from all of those angles. It has given me a good understanding of sports and society and how it ties together."

As an undergraduate manager, Kent will help the team with individual workouts, administrative work, film exchange and his favorite, scouting reports.

"One of the things I'm really looking forward to is the film side of things," Kent said. "To sit down and dissect another team is something I'm really looking forward to."

The knowledge he gained on the sidelines will be a valuable experience; however, Kent doesn't know whether he wants to go into coaching as a career.

"I don't know if I could be a career coach because I don't know if I could handle that lifestyle," Kent said.

That decision can be made in the future, while the present will consist of Kent helping the Oregon basketball program to success.

"I'd like to think the greatest thing I can offer these guys is my experience," Kent said.

Even if that is the only thing he can offer, it will be more than enough.

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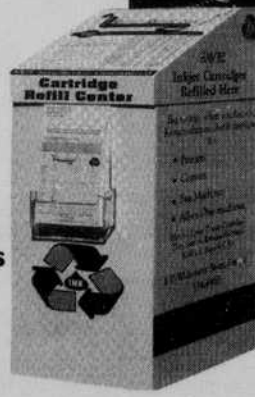


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Baseball: Volcanoes break Ems' winning streak
