## DARRYL ORTIS GRADUATES FROM HILL ACADEMY, RELATES SCHOOL EXPERIENCES



The first Indian student to graduate from Hill Military Academy in Portland since 1895 was Darryl Ortis, grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Hiram Robbins of Sprague River. Darryl picked up his diploma early in June and describes at as "about the biggest thing I've seen". The information that he was the first Indian graduate in 63 years Darryl got straight from Mr. Hill, ownermanager of the school.

In discussing the school, Darryl says it has an enrollment of about 75 students in the 12 grades. He thinks it is about like any other except that everything is done according to army regulations.

"We wake up by the bugle 6:15 A.M.) and go to bed by the bugle.

In between bugle blasts Darryl and his fellow students taste a lot of other morsels of military life, as witness:

1. They wear a uniform at all times "except when we don't have one" (due to ripped pants, need for laundering, etc.).

2. Passes are issued a la mili-

tary with all students getting weekend passes unless restricted for disciplinary reasons and seniors also receiving Wednesday night passes.

3. Duties include standing in school and weekend guard, doing k.p., etc.

 Disciplinary action is meted out and consists in marching on pass time and hacks, which the Captain administers. According to Darryl, "The Captain" is a retired military officer who fills much the same position as the principal in a regular school.

5. Rank is awarded according to how the student gets along in school. The equivalent of all ranks in the regular army are found. Darryl attained the rank of Tech. Sargeaut before graduation.

Darryl says some of the students didn't like the school and took off. For his part, however, he likes Hill, particularly for the discipline. He plans to enter the army this fall and feels that Hill has given him good preparation for the service. He points out that some of the school's graduates
