### SEALED BIDS FOR STREET IMPROVEMENT.

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received by the city council of the City of St. Helens, Oregon, for the improvement of Summer street as follows, to wit: All that portion of said street lying between the center line of Wyeth street and the center line of West street, by grading the same to a width of twenty-four feet through the center thereof, to wit: for twelve feet on each side of the center line of said street and macadamizing said grade for a width of sixteen feet, to wit: for eight feet on each side of the center line of said street with crushed basalt rock; said crushed rock to be eight inches in depth in the center and be gradually reduced to four inches at the outer edge; said bids to be filed with the City Recorder on or before January 15th, 1914.
