The Redmen.

The Improved Order of Red Men having Tribes at Scappoose, Warren, Goble and Yankton is a factor in the development of Columbia County as well as its social life. The Yankton Tribe is the youngest of the four, having been organized in May 1909 with about 20 charter members. Regular councils have been held twice a month at the Grange Hall with a steady increase in the membership until now their numbers is something over 60. Last May the four-year-old Tribe decided that having outgrown its swaddling clothes it was time to strike out and build a home of its own, accordingly plans were laid and the work of raising funds began. A corner lot was obtained and some lumber before the "Fourth". Many friends who celebrated that day with the Yankton Red Men will long remember the neat pavilion erected by the voluntary work of the brothers of Tillicum Tribe for their accommodation and the pleasant day and evening spent with them. Early in October the work of building a commodious hall was begun, U. W. Clark was obtained as master workman and one of the finest buildings owned and occupied by any Order in the County now stands on the corner of St. Helens and Kappler Streets, Tillicum Tribe has reason to be proud of its new home, which was occupied for the first time January 10th 1914. The lodge room dining hall and ante rooms are tastefully finished in Oregon Fir.

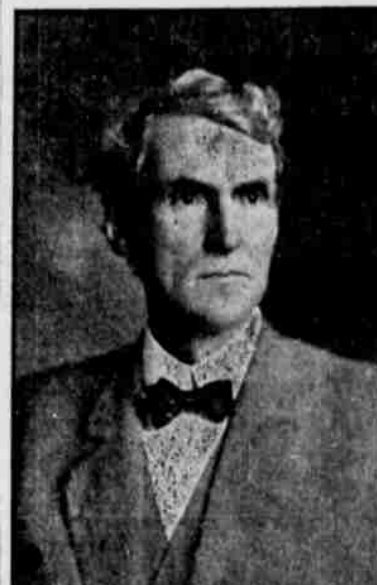

William Henry Beaver.

At his home, near Warren, on Jan. 12th, Wm. Henry Beaver passed away at the age of 73 years.

The deceased was born in Bates county, Missouri, Dec. 25th, 1840; was married to Matilda Jane Grey, May 16, 1861; served as a home guard during the Civil war; crossed the plains to Oregon in 1865 and homesteaded a tract of land near Warren, where he has lived continuously since.

To this union was born twelve children, five of whom are still living: John, George, Melvira, Mrs. Anna Bennett and Mrs. Etta Lamberson. There are eighteen living grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at Scappoose Wednesday and the remains were interred in the Scappoose cemetery.

Mr. Beaver was one of the pioneers of Columbia county and a most estimable and worthy citizen. He has been a factor in the growth and development of the county for nearly fifty years and his loss will be felt by the community in which he lived as well as by his immediate family.

RESOLUTION.

At the council meeting on last Monday evening the following resolution was unanimously adopted by the council:

WHEREAS, on the 15th day of November, 1913, each of the cities of St. Helens, Oregon, and Houlton, Oregon, the same being contiguous cities, held a special election upon due and legal notice, for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of said cities, the question of consolidating said cities, at which election both cities voted to so consolidate under the name of St. Helens; and due returns and abstracts as required by law made and filed with the Secretary of the State of Oregon; and,

WHEREAS, on the 7th day of January, A. D. 1914, there was held in said City of St. Helens, Oregon, in pursuance of law, a special election for the purpose of electing the City officers required by law and the Charter of said City, to-wit: One Mayor; Four Councilmen; One Treasurer, and Five Water Commissioners, at which election all of said officials were elected, the returns duly canvassed and the result declared; and said officers duly took the oath of office and were duly installed; and the said cities thereby became consolidated under the name of the City of St. Helens, Oregon; and,

WHEREAS, the name of St. Helens should now appear on all time tables, notices, tickets and all other printed matter issued by any railroad, in place of the station Houlton, as the same has heretofore appeared;

Now therefore be it resolved by the people of the said City of St. Helens, acting through their Mayor and Common Council, that The Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railway Company be respectfully requested to change the name of the Houlton Station to that of St. Helens, and that said change be caused to appear upon all time tables, folders, notices, tickets, advertisements and all other printed matter issued by said Railway company; and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to said Railway company.

We, the owners of a majority of the abutting real property, upon the hereinafter described streets in said City of St. Helens, hereby petition your Honorable body to improve Tulatin street, from the center line of Casneau street to the west line of Winter street, and thence southerly along winter street to the center line of Plymouth street, by grading the same for a width of twelve feet, to-wit: for six feet on each side of the center line of said portions of said streets, and also by draining the same thoroughly; And your petitioners will ever pray.
