County Court Proceedings

Be it remembered, That a regular term of the county court of the State of Oregon, for Columbia County was begun and held at the Court House in the City of St. Helens, in said county and state on Wednesday, the 5th day of March, 1913, the same being the time fixed by law for holding a regular term of said Court, when were present: Hon. W. A. Harris, County Judge. Hon. John Farr, Commissioner. Hon. Louis Fluhrer, Commissioner. H. E. LaBare, Clerk. A. E. Thompson, Sheriff.

Due proclamation being made the following proceedings were had: Journal read, approved and signed.

Matter of petition of E. J. Smith et al for a county road.

On this 5th day of March, 1913, comes on for hearing the petition of E. J. Smith and seventeen others, freeholders residing in the road district or districts of said proposed road, praying for the establishment of a county road, described as follows: Beginning at a post marked "A" in the center of the north end of West street, Scappoose, Oregon; thence running north 199 feet to a post marked "B"; thence in a northwesterly direction 675 feet more or less to a stake marked "C" on the west bank of the south fork of the Scappoose Creek, being the east corner between tracts 14 and 15 of the Holiday Orchard Tracts; 907.61 feet to an iron pin marked "D", being 27.61 feet northwest from the corner of tracts 26, 27, 31 and 32 of the Holiday Orchard Tracts; thence 831 feet west to a stake marked "E" being 10 feet west of the west corner, between tracts 29 and 30 of the Holiday Orchard Tracts; thence north 660 feet to a stake marked "F" being 10 feet west of the north-west corner of section 12, thence north 375 feet to the line between H. Schmidt and the Hegele lands; thence in a westerly direction along the line of said Hegele land 1800 feet to the southwest corner of the said Hegele land; thence in a westerly direction 308 feet more or less to the road between tracts 21 and 22 of Apple Valley Tracts to a stake marked "G". Said road to be forty (40) feet in width.

the court from proof filed herein, that due notice of the pendency of this proceeding has been given as by law required, that twelve of said petitioners are legal freeholders of this county, residing in the road district or districts of the proposed road, and that a good and sufficient bond has been given and filed herein. It is therefore ordered by the court that the board of county road viewers meet at Scappoose, Ore., on the 7th day of April, 1913, or on their failure to meet on said day, then within five days thereafter, and proceed to view, survey and locate said proposed road.

Matter of petition of Joseph Hackenberg et al for a county road.

On this 5th day of March, 1913, comes on for hearing the petition of Joseph Hackenberg and 72 others, freeholders, residing in the road district or districts of said proposed road, praying for the establishment of a county road, described as follows:

Beginning at a stake A in the Doan road, 64 rods south of a corner established 80 rods east of the corner of Sec. 2, 3, 34 and 35 of the line dividing townships 6 and 7 north of range 3 West, Will Mer., in Beaver Valley, said county and state, and going in a northerly direction on the east bank of the South Beaver Creek, crossing it at stake B; thence going on the west bank to stake C; from there following county road to stake D, branching at stake E, in a southeasterly direction to stake F; thence back to stake E and from there in a northeasterly direction past stakes F and G, on the most practical route to Station No. 111 x 00 in the I. D. Wonderly road, with the least possible damage to John L. Lanes's premises.

We also petition that said road and all the old portions of county roads from the Aphy road to Strick D on the banks of said creek be legalized to a 60 feet width and the whole route be called the South Beaver road.

And it satisfactorily appearing to the court from proof filed herein, that due notice of the pendency of this proceeding has been given as by law required, that twelve of said petitioners are legal freeholders of this county, residing in the road district or districts of the proposed road, and that a good and sufficient bond has been given and filed herein.

It is therefore ordered by the court that the board of county road viewers meet at Rainier, Oregon, on the 9th day of April, 1913, or on their failure to meet on said day, then within five days thereafter, and proceed to view, survey and locate said proposed road.

Matter of petition of Andrew Anderson et al for a county road.

On this 5th day of March, 1913, in the sum of \$7.60, as levied against the personal property of said Junia Maclay for the year 1910, the tax collector is hereby authorized and instructed to remit the penalty and interest charged against said assessment.

Matter of petition of Hattie J. Leonard for remission of tax.

On this day this matter coming on for consideration upon the sworn petition of Hattie J. Leonard for remission of personal property tax for year 1910, amounting to \$10.52, including penalty and interest.

And it appearing to the court from said petition that said petitioner did not own the said personal property, or its equivalent, on the 1st day of March, 1910, and the court being advised in the matter, it is ordered by the court that said petition be and the same is hereby allowed.

Whereupon, court adjourned until Thursday, March 6, 1913.

On this day it is ordered by the court that the sum of \$300 be and the same is hereby appropriated for the benefit of the Columbia County Fair Association, to be used in paying premiums for exhibits for fair to be held in 1913.

It is further ordered by the court that the clerk be and he is hereby authorized and instructed to issue a general fund warrant in said sum of \$300 in favor of the secretary of said Fair Association, at such time request may be made therefor by such secretary.
