County Official Paper

The old press on which we have been printing the Mist has outlived its usefulness in this office. It will not do the work required of it in a satisfactory manner. So this week we have installed a late two revolution cylinder press that will do the very best work. The size of our paper has been reduced one column, but the number of pages of home news has been increased and will be again increased within a few weeks. We are going to get out an eight page all home print paper, giving all the news of St. Helens and vicinity, with correspondence from various parts of the county. We will also have a complete account each week of the happenings at the court house, such as real estate transfers, marriage licenses, law suits tried and the doings of the county officers. In short, we are going to improve the paper in every way possible and before long a campaign will be started to get new subscribers that will be a winner.

The St. Helens band boys are deserving of better support from the citizens of the city than they are getting. At the dance last Saturday night only a fair sized crowd greeted the boys and they feel that the giving of dances will have to be discontinued unless more people help them out. There is considerable expense incident to keeping up a good band and it seems that after two years of digging up that the city or the citizens should help out. The mayor in his message to the council last week recommended that band concerts be given and that the city pay for it. Why not the city put up a band stand on the Strand near the Court House so that about one evening in the week a nice concert could be given. Then on Sunday afternoons a concert in Godfrey Park would be a nice thing. The boys are willing to do their full part, but they must have some help from the citizens and the city.

The last legislature passed a bill providing for county fairs and making an apportionment from the state fund for each county. The share allotted to Columbia county for this year amounts to \$922, which will be sent to proper authorities in September. The money will be used by the recognized county fair association, which in this county is the Yankton County Fair Association, under immediate charge of the Grange. The county has already appropriated \$300 and with the state apportionment enough money will be available to make this the opportunity for the best fair ever held in the county. The management of the fair at Yankton is already working to make the 1913 fair a great success, and it is up to every man interested to get in and help. A premium list is being arranged and will be sent out in due time so that all will be able to arrange to send an exhibit and attend.

Senator Cev. E. Chamberlain has prepared and will introduce a resolution in the United States senate for the purpose of abrogating the present treaties between the United States and Great Britain. The apparent primary object of the resolution is to settle the trouble regarding the tolls to be charged for the

use of the Panama Canal, so that this country can do as it pleases in that respect. It is hardly probable that the United States will take such action without entering into some other treaty with England, but Senator Chamberlain has started the ball rolling so that it will bring the nations together in some adjustment of the matter.

At the foot of St. Helens street in this city on every afternoon is found several boys riding in skiffs, tubs, rafts and logs on the river. They wait for the large boats to pass so that they can ride the waves in their craft. It is extremely dangerous and parents should certainly not permit it. The practice will surely result in the drowning of some of them unless they are called off.
