Potato News
Since a large part of the potato crop of the western part of Oregon was destroyed by late blight, the following advice from E. D. Bailey, expert plant pathologist at the Oregon Agricultural college is of immediate value:
"There is no practical seed treatment for the control of this fungus pest. Growers must select the seed with care, so that rotting or discolored potatoes are not used. Even the many tubers will be planted carrying the blight fungus in a dormant condition, ready to start infection of crops in moist, warm weather. The most that can be hoped for is to use seed that will germinate well. If conditions are favorable for blight later it will be necessary to spray with Bor-
