Potato News

Since a large part of the poato crop of the western part of bregon was destroyed by late light, the following advice from Pele Mele. D. Bailey, expert plant pahologist at the Oregon Agriultural college is of immediate

"There is no practical seed reatment for the control of this ! ungus pest. Growers must seect the seed with care, so that otting or discolored pototoes are ot used. Even the many tubers will be planted carrying the light fungus in a dormant condition, ready to start infection of ops in moist, warm weather. The most that can be hoped for s to use seed that will germinate well. If conditions are favorable for blight later it will be necessary to spray with Bor-
