RAILROAD ACTIVITY

A crew of about 100 men will soon be at work constructing two miles of railroad on the line of the St. Helens Timber Co, formerly known as the Masten road. The grading machinery has arrived and work has already commenced. Another crew with grading machinery has also arrived to build a spur from St. Helens to the new mill now being erected by Sherman Brothers on the tract of land formerly owned by the Oregon Wood Co, near the reservoir of the city water works. This spur will be some three miles in length and will be rushed to completion at once.
