### ASK AID TO FIGHT FIRE

#### TIMBERMEN PETITION COUNTY COURT FOR APPROPRIATION

Last Wednesday Messrs. C. C. Chapman, Sec. of the Oregon Forest Fire Association, John Pearson of the Chapman Timber Co., John Stewart, Geo. McPherson and Mr. Chaney, all representing approximately 250,000 acres of timber lands in this county, appeared before the County Court for the purpose of seeking aid of the county in the fighting of forest fires during the summer. The court took the matter under advisement.

If you like to have the birds about your place undisturbed it will be well to put a quail on those small red squirrels with a target rifle. If you do not they will not only destroy the birds' eggs, but will kill their half grown young ones.

Have an eye for the small fruit. It is easily tended to and harvested, and by careful handling at canning time it will greatly assist in cutting down the living expenses. It is more conducive to good health, too, than so much greasy meat, gravy, etc.

It is an interesting commentary on the method of farming that is being followed in many western states that the average yield of corn is steadily decreasing in the central western portion of the corn belt, but that it is on the increase in the eastern states.

The health of many families as well as their pocketbooks would be a good deal better off if during the summer months they would substitute other forms of protein food in place of meat. Among these are garden vegetables, milk and its byproducts, nuts, cereals, fish and eggs.

#### NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS OF SEWER IMPROVEMENT

Whereas, the common council of the city of St. Helens, Oregon, did on the 26th day of May A. D., 1913, pass an ordinance declaring its intention to improve Sewer District No. 6 of said city, by constructing a sewer therein; which said Sewer District No. 6 is embraced and entirely included within the following boundaries, to-wit:

Beginning at the intersection of the center line of Wyeth street with that of Walla Walla street, in said city of St. Helens, and running thence southerly on the center

line of Walla Walla street 446 feet; thence westerly and parallel with Wyeth street 800 feet to the east line of Bond street, thence northerly on the east line of Bond street 290 feet; thence westerly at right angles to Bond street, 190 feet to the center of lots 9, 10, 13 and 14, in block 92 of said city; thence southerly and parallel with Bond street, 232 feet to the common corner of lots 5, 6, 17 and 18 in said block 92; thence westerly and parallel with Williams-ette street, 420 feet to the center line of Pine street; thence northerly on the center line of Pine street, 348 feet to the south line of Wyeth street; thence westerly on the south line of Wyeth street, 420 feet; thence southerly at right angles to Wyeth street, 116 feet to the common corner of lots 9, 10, 13 and 14 in block 111 of said city; thence westerly and parallel with Wyeth street, 280 feet to the common corner of lots 9, 10, 13 and 14 in block 124 of said city; thence northerly at right angles, 602 feet to the common corner of lots 7, 8, 15 and 16 in block 125 of said city; thence westerly at right angles, 528 feet, more or less, to the east line of the S.
