Old Time Patriot Pirate of the Gulf of Mexico.

HE WAS COURTLY AND BRAVE

And as Mild a Mannered Man as Ever Scuttled Ship or Cut a Throat-He Boldly Faced Andrew Jackson, Won His Friendship and Fought For Him.

In the brave days of old Jean Lafitte, the patriot pirate of the gulf, ruled over a little outlaw kingdom of his own within a few miles of the city of New Orleans.

A picturesque figure was Jean Lafitte, with a graceful, courtly delivery about him which made him popular with many of the most estimable dwellers in New Orleans. Handsome, able, averse to the shedding of blood and even possessed of loyalty to the government whose excise laws he treade it his boutness to break

Laffite was French. He drifted to Louisiana in the early years of the numbered 2, 3, 4, block 9, lots nineteenth century and set up in piracy in the bay of Barataria, a sheltered harbor on the gulf of Mexico, protected by a long island called Grand Terre, where Jean Lafitte dwelt in a house of brick, with broad and com-

No crude or common pirate was this Jean Lafitte. He held a privateer's commission from the republic of Cartagena, which had been recently established in South America and has long since been forgotten, and this commission gave him the right to plunder Spanish ships. Lafitte's followers were a motley collection black, white, yeilow and red restless and reckiess rovers of the sea. Lafitte trafficked in sitk and gold and negroes and sold his goods openly at auction even in the city of New Orleans.

He was popular, too; there is no doubt of that. Had it been atherwise he would not have been permitted to early as 1800 we find governors of Lon-Islama thunslering against him, but Lafitte went camuly about his ber-thesa Occasionally a revenue officer was killed in a brush with the pirates. Invariably Lautte expressed blasorrow that bloodshed had become necessary. case was brought against him in the federal court. The district attorney was a man named Grymes. Lafitte went o see Grymes, and the result of the visit was that the district afterney re igned his office and undertook Lafitte's tereuse. He and the lawyer who as sisted him were promised \$20,000 apiece for their services and get it. After the case was dismissed Grymes went to Baraturia to receive his fee nd spent a week feasting with the strates, who treated him with princely espitality and escorted him back to to Mississippi in a hardsome yawi, aden with cuskets of gold and silver.

Repeated attempts had been made to rganise a military expedition to detroy Lantie's pirate colony, but up to he year 1814 they had always come to nothing. In September of that year a British brig anchored six miles from Barataria pass, and its captain came cahere and offered Lafitte a captain's minission in the British mayy and \$30,000 if he would join the British In an attack against New Orleans.

Lafitte pretended to consider the offor, sending word meantime to a memher of the legislature of the British captain's offer and declaring that he would never accept it. He sent on the er letter to Governor Chalborne, who had offered \$5,000 for Lafitte's head and for whose head Lafitte in return, in a spirit of gay brayado, had offered a reward of \$50,000. Laffite suggested that the governor extend clemency to is pirates, who in return would aid in defense of the state against the British. The offer was rejected, and an expedition under Commodore Pat-terion of the United States havy swooped down on Barataria unexpectedly, tore down the brick house, con-

Jean Lafitte and his brother Plerre caped and established themselves on the lower Mississippi. Meanwhile An drew Jackson had arrived to under take the defense of New Orleans. Jean Luftite went boldly into New Orleans to see him, although the flery general had declared he would have nothing to do with "these pirates and hellish banditti." There must have been a pecultur charm and persunsiveness about Jean Lafitte, for after the interview Jackson changed his mind, accepted the aid of the pirates and showed the atmost trust in them. And throughout the slege of New Orleans the followers of Lafitte showed themselves worthy of confidence. They were excellent gunners, and two of Laffite's captains. Dominique You and a man named Baluche, were put in charge of ships, When the British land been detven away Jackson recommended that La fitte and his men be granted pardon for all previous misdemennors, and the thing was done.

Nobody seems to know exactly what became of Jean Lafitte and his brother. in 1816 we find Jean in Galveston, Tex, whence he was chased by the Spanish government in 1839. Later there came stories of cruises in the Caribbean. The call of the sea was too strong for the one time Baratarian. Kansas City Star.
