POULTRY DEPARTMENT

The poultry department of the Columbia County Fair was a surprise to everyone, both in quality and quantity, the only drawback being that the building was overcrowded. There were 363 head of poultry and pet stock, besides quite a number that were taken back home on account of lack of room. Geo. Lemont captured the largest prize with his display of turkeys, geese, ducks, pheasants, pigeons, guinea and rabbits; though some thought that the pigeon display by R. Hamill was the most attractive. He had a large number of varieties of extra fine birds. Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Larson of Goble received the most ribbons on chickens, with a display of Buff Leghorns, Buff Orpingtons and Reds. Their birds were all of fine quality, the first Leghorn pen especially so. Intervale Farm, owned by Ray Tarbell of Yankton, had a good showing of B. P. Rocks and Anconas, one of his Ancona pens getting first parti-colored pen and also a very favorable comment from the judge. T. Brown of Yankton got the first solid colored pen with his White Wyandottes, the White Rocks shown by the Clover Hill Farm of Deer Island were good birds, as also were those shown by Iva Tarbell of Yankton. Among the B. P. Rocks the cockerel exhibited by Mrs. P. Felton was by far the best bird in his class. Many other exhibitors had a few good birds each, and the display of Belgian hares was fine, 1st going to W. C. Morley. The judging was done by M. S. Myers of Portland in a very satisfactory manner. Mr. Myers said our show was the best in quality of any he had judged this season.

Ball Season is Over

ST. HELENS TEAM WINS 13 AND LOSES 4 DURING SEASON

The base ball season for St. Helens is over for the year. The season has been a successful one from the standpoint of winning games and giving the people good entertainment, but from a financial standpoint it was not so much of a success as should have been. During the season the St. Helens team played 17 games, winning 13 of them. The players were nearly all local boys and manager I. E. Ballagh is to be congratulated for handling the ball team in the satisfactory manner in which he did. The last game of the season was with Woodland last Saturday, which resulted in a victory for St. Helens by a score of 8 to 5. Posters were out announcing three games between St. Helens and Rainier during the three days of the fair last week, but for some unknown cause the Rainier team failed to keep its date. This failure on the part of the boys from down the river caused quite a little disappointment to the locals as well as to the fans who were expecting a royal good time and some real base ball games.

Ralph O. Hazen

Mr. Ralph O. Hazen, a respected resident of Warren, in this county, passed away at his home last Tuesday evening after an illness lasting several weeks, caused from asthma and heart troubles.

Mr. Hazen was born in Pennsylvania in April, 1850, and was 63 years old at the time of his death. He came to Columbia county in 1879, and settled on a farm near Warren and has made his home there ever since. He leaves a widow, two sons and two daughters, all living at Warren, besides several brothers in different parts of Oregon.

The children left by him are Mrs. W. C. Cooper, Mrs. Edith Bacon, George Hazen, and Arthur Hazen.

Funeral services were held at the family home in Warren yesterday afternoon, and more than two hundred friends and relatives attended to show the high esteem in which the deceased was held.

Rev. F. J. Meyers, of the Congregational Church of St. Helens, preached the funeral sermon, and interment was had in the I. O. O. F. cemetery at Warren.

The Pender Trial

FAMOUS MURDER CASE TO BE TRIED OCTOBER 14TH

Circuit Court will convene in St. Helens in regular session on Tuesday, Oct. 14th. The first case to be tried will be the State vs. John Pender, charged with murdering Daisy Wehrman near Scappoose on September 4th, 1911. In June 1912 Pender was tried before a jury in St. Helens, and after deliberating for about 40 hours the jury failed to agree. Since then the trial has been delayed from time to time for various reasons until now. It is probable that the trial of the case will take two weeks, as there are a large number of witnesses on both sides to be examined in addition to the task of selecting a jury which will be satisfactory to both sides. E. B. Tongue, District Attorney, will handle the case for the state and John F. Logan and John Stevenson will handle the defense.

Road Survey Assured

County Court Passes Resolution Asking Aid of State Commission

PERMANENT ROAD SYSTEM TO BE ESTABLISHED

In the County Court of the State of Oregon, for Columbia County:

Whereas, it is deemed to be a public necessity, by the County Court of Columbia County, State of Oregon, to raise money by issuing its bonds, under the provisions of Chapter 103, Oregon Laws of 1913, for the purpose of constructing and maintaining a system of permanent roads in Columbia County, and

Whereas, petitions have been filed duly signed by a large number of the freeholders of said county, praying for the establishment of a system of permanent road as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at a point on the main county road from St. Helens to Portland, Oregon, where said road intersects the boundary line between Multnomah and Columbia counties, thence running in a northerly and westerly direction to a point on the west boundary line of Columbia County, where the said line intersects the county road from Clatskanie, Ore., to Westport, Ore., said road to run through the cities and towns of Scappoose, Warren, St. Helens, Deer Island, Goble, Rainier, Mayger, Clatskanie and Marshland, and following as near as practicable to obtain desired grades and curves, the present county road between said points, also

Beginning at a point where the Beaver Creek county road intersects the line between Washington and Columbia Counties, thence running in a northerly and westerly direction to the boundary line between Columbia and Clatsop Counties, and running through the towns and cities of Vernonia, Pittsburg and Mist, and following as near as practicable, to obtain desired grades and curves, the present

county road between said points and towns; also

Beginning at a point which is at the intersection of the center line of Bridge and Nehalem streets in the City of Clatskanie, Oregon, running thence in a southerly direction, and following as near as practicable to obtain the desired grades and curves, the present county road from Clatskanie, Ore., to Mist, Ore., to the intersection of said road with the county road from Vernonia to Mist, Ore., also

Beginning at a point which is at the intersection of Cowitz and Columbia streets in the City of St. Helens, Oregon, running thence westerly through the towns of Houlton, Yankton and Trenholm, and following as near as practicable, to obtain the desired grades and curves, the present county road from St. Helens, Oregon, to Pittsburg, Oregon, and

Whereas, said County Court desires to have such a system of permanent roads planned, located and constructed with the co-operation of the Oregon State Highway Commission, therefore

Be It Resolved, by the County Court of Columbia County, Oregon, that it does hereby petition the Oregon State Highway Commission to lend to it the services of the State Highway Engineer for the above purposes, and

Resolved, further, that the County Court of Columbia County, does hereby set aside sufficient money to pay for the surveys, maps, profiles and estimates of the said proposed permanent road system.

Adopted at St. Helens, Oregon, this 2nd day of October, 1913.

ARRESTED FOR FELONY
