STUDENTS PROTEST

RESOLUTION REQUEST AID OF VOTERS FOR U. OF O. APPROPRIATIONS

Eugene, Ore., Sept. 22, 1913.

To the Editor:

We, the University students from Clatsop, Tillamook, Columbia and Lincoln counties, met today and discussed the referendum upon our University's two building appropriations, upon which the state will vote November 4th. We wish to make through you the following statement to the people of our respective counties. The progress of the University of Oregon is especially befitting the great state to which the University belongs. The registration growth this year is over ten per cent. Since the last new building was erected it has doubled. We have confidence that our state will ultimately be one of the foremost in the union; we do not want our University to drop behind it.

Since 1908 a small body of men in Portland have constantly dogged this school. They have fought it in the legislature and by gross misuse of the people's referendum they have contrived to delay its legitimate appropriations.

The University's two principal classroom buildings were put up in 1876 and 1886, respectively. To accommodate overflow classes this fall carpenters had to be summoned to throw up a small temporary structure.

The new building and the repairs to four of the eleven old ones are most urgently needed, and he it, therefore, by us in convention assembled

Resolved, that we urge every man and every woman who votes in Clatsop, Tillamook, Columbia and Lincoln counties to register for this special election, the registration limit for which is October 20; and

Resolved, that we earnestly entreat him to vote to uphold the University's two bills; and

Resolved, that we view with alarm the practice of small coteries of men with sinister purposes who resort to the people's power laws further these purposes, and thereby bring into disrepute the popular government of our state.
