Pursuant to a petition signed by ninety qualified electors of the city of St. Helens, Oregon, presented to the Mayor and Common Council of said City, praying that a special election be held in said city on Saturday, the 15th day of November, A. D., 1913, for the purpose of submitting to the electors of said city the question of whether the City of St. Helens shall be consolidated with the City of Houlton, Oregon, a contiguous municipal corporation, under the name of the City of St. Helens, Oregon;

Now, therefore, by order of the Mayor of the City of St. Helens, Oregon, and the Common Council thereof, notice is hereby given that on Saturday, Nov. 15th, A. D., 1913, beginning at the hour of 8 o'clock in the morning of said day and continuing until 7 o'clock in the afternoon thereof, a special election will be held at the City Hall in the City of St. Helens, Oregon, for the purpose of submitting to the electors of said City of St. Helens the question whether said City of St. Helens and the City of Houlton shall be consolidated into one corporation.
