Ordinance No. 166

An ordinance limiting the number of saloons for the dispensing of spirituous malt or various liquors or fermented cider, to be allowed within the city of St. Helens, Oregon

The City of St. Helens does ordain as follows:

Section 1: That until the population of the City of St. Helens shall reach 3500 people to be determined by the then last Federal State or city census, not to exceed seven saloons for dispensing spirituous malt or various liquors or fermented cider shall be permitted or licensed within the limits of said city of St. Helens as now constituted

Section 2: That all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed
