Ordinance No. —

An ordinance regulating the construction, erection, enlargement rais-

ing and alteration of buildings, within certain prescribed limits in the city of St. Helens, Oregon; to provide against fire, and providing a penalty for any violation of the same.

The City of St. Helens does ordain as follows:

Section 1. There is hereby created an executive department of the municipal government of the city of St. Helens, Oregon, which shall be known as the building committee, which shall consist of the Mayor and two members of the Common Council,--said members being appointed by the Mayor; and said members shall hold such office during their respective terms as such Mayor and Councilmen.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of said Committee to pass upon the structure and material, and examine and approve all plans, specifications, of all buildings hereafter erected or to be erected within the fire limits hereinafter described, before a permit for the erection of such structure shall be issued; and said Committee shall sign and issue all permits, certificates and notices required to be issued, provided however, that if a permit, certificate or notice, is signed by any two members of said committee, it shall be deemed sufficient. Such Committee shall also inspect all buildings hereafter erected or in course of erection within the fire limits of said city and cause immediate prosecution of any person violating any law or ordinance in relation hereto, or enjoin any such erection.

Section 3. Application for a permit to build, renew, alter or remove any building or structure under this ordinance, shall be filed with the City Recorder, whose duty it shall be to submit the same to the Committee at the next meeting of the Council, and said Committee shall act upon the same without unnecessary delay.

Section 4. Hereafter it shall be unlawful to erect or cause to be erected within the fire limits as prescribed by this ordinance, areas, they shall be hereafter enlarged or extended, any building or structure unless the front, side and back walls and roof of the same shall be of incombustible material with all inside and back windows of wire glass having outside casings of metal. And if it appears to said Committee that any building for which a permit is so applied for is not to be constructed of materials and in the manner required by law or ordinance, or if such building is not safe or of proper construction, then a permit shall be denied.

Section 5. The fire limits or district of the City of St. Helens shall include all of Blocks Ten, Eleven and Eighteen, and all of Lots 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, and 22, in Block Nineteen, in said City.

Section 6. Hereafter it shall be unlawful to re-construct or renew any building within the above described fire limits, if the cost of said reconstruction or renewal shall exceed 35 per cent. of the original cost of said building.

Section 7. Hereafter it shall be unlawful to remove from one location to another, any building or structure within the fire limits above described, or to remove any building from without the boundaries of said fire limits to a point within fire limits, unless said buildings or structures are constructed of materials as prescribed in this ordinance.

Section 8. Incombustible material for walls, within the meaning of this ordinance shall be brick, stone, terra cotta, concrete, iron or steel, when used alone or in combination with each other; and incombustible roofing shall be a roof covered with not less than two thicknesses of building felt and a good coat of tar and gravel, or with tin, corrugated iron or other fire resisting material, with standing seam or lap joint.

Section 9. Any person, firm, company or corporation, that violates, disobeys, neglects or refuses to comply with any of the provisions of this ordinance or maintains any building or structure which was erected in violation of the same, or who occupies any such building after notice from said Committee, shall be punished by a fine of not to exceed \$50.00 or by imprisonment for not to exceed three months, or by both such fine and imprisonment; and every person, firm, company or corporation shall be deemed guilty of a separate offense for every day such violation, disobedience, neglect or refusal shall continue, and shall be subject to the penalty of this section for each and every separate offense; and so much of any building or structure as may be erected or altered in violation of this ordinance shall be condemned and torn down, at the expense of the person, firm, company or corporation erecting or altering the same.
