Continued from Page 1

In comparing the air pitting method with blasting the price of a set of burners are probably equal to the amount of money invested in powder required to blast 30 or 40 large stumps, and the money paid for powder can only be applied once, while the burners can be used indefinitely and the results are that by burning with the improved method you do not have to fill the holes made by blasting and dispose of the stumps after they have been blasted. This medthod will be demonstrated at the Dr. Ross farm near Yankton on the 26-27-28th of
