## Motorcars to be Placed on Railroad Service

### Coaches Will Operate From Portland to St Helens, Rainier and Clatskanie

#### THE SERVICE WILL BE VERY MUCH IMPROVED

#### S. P. and S. Company Announces change in Service to Take Place About June 1st

Motor car service will be established by the S P and S Ry Co between Portland and Clatskanie with the attendant service to all points between. It is announced by the company that gasoline motorcars, with sufficient power to haul trailers will be put into actual service about June 1st and that the passenger and express traffic will be much better accommodated as well as a very noticeable increase in the mail service between Columbia county points.

The regular steam trains now in ser-

vice will be displaced and a schedule adopted better suited to meet the demands of the patrons of this portion of the road. At least two round trips each day will be made by the motor cars between Clatskanie and Portland with stops at all the stations, so the service will equal any of the electric car services out of Portland. All of which will be pleasing news to the people of Columbia county who have been clamoring for some such service for a long time.
