

County Court Proceedings

Wednesday, June 3rd, 1914. 8th Judicial Day.

Court came pursuant to adjournment.

Officers all present.

Due proclamation being made, the following proceedings were had.

In the matter of the claim of J. J. Havlik for indemnity for slaughtered cattle.

On this 3rd day of June, 1914, comes on for hearing the claim of J. J. Havlik, of Scappoose, Oregon, for indemnity in the sum of Fifty and 00-100 Dollars, for two grade Jersey cows over two years old, slaughtered by the State Live Stock Sanitary Board, under chapter 14, General Laws of 1913, and it appearing to the Court from the certificates and affidavits on file relating thereto, that said animals were slaughtered on the 3rd day of April, 1914, in Portland, Oregon, at the slaughter house of Frank L. Smith, and that said claimant has complied with all the provisions of said chapter 14, General Laws of 1913. It is therefore ordered by the Court that said claim be, and the same is hereby allowed.

It is further ordered by the Court that the Clerk be, and he is hereby authorized and instructed to issue a general fund warrant in the sum of \$25.00, in favor of said J. J. Havlik, being one-half of said sum so allowed as indemnity.

It is further ordered by the Court that the Clerk prepare and transmit to the Secretary of State, a certified copy of this order.

Matter of Bids for steel vault fixtures.

On this day this matter coming on for consideration for furnishing 112 roller shelves and 98 document files, according to plans and specifications on file, bids for furnishing same, in the vault in the office of the County Clerk, were opened and examined, being as follows:

Kilham Stationery & Printing Co., for the sum of \$429.09.

Pacific Stationery & Printing Co., for the sum of \$403.50.

Bushong & Co., for the sum of \$374.90.

Glass & Prudhomme Co., for the sum of \$360.00.

And it appearing to the Court that the bid of Glass & Prudhomme Company is the lowest and best bid, it is

ordered by the Court that an order be placed with Glass & Prudhomme Company for said steel fixtures.

Matter of Petition of D. M. Robinette, et. al. for change of County Road:

On this 3rd day of June, 1914, comes on for hearing the petition of D. M. Robinette, et. al., freeholders, residing in the road districts of said proposed change, praying for a change in the D. M. Robinette Road, described as follows:

Beginning at a stake marked "A" set 100 feet west of the Township line between Townships 5 N R 1 west and Township 5 N R 2 west and where said Township line crosses the present Yankton County Road near the steel bridge across Milton Creek and near the residence of John Huber thence running in a Northeasterly course on the most practical route 20 rods more or less, to and terminating at a stake marked "B" set on said above mentioned Township line, and to vacate all that portion of said Robinette County Road which the above proposed change of road takes the place of.

Said proposed change of road to be forty feet in width.

And it satisfactorily appearing to the Court from proof filed herein, that due notice of the pendency of this proceeding has been given, as by law required, that twelve of said petitioners are legal freeholders of this county, residing in the road district or districts of the proposed road, and that a good and sufficient bond has been given and filed herein;

It is therefore ordered by the Court that the Board of County Road Viewers meet at said steel bridge on the Yankton road, on the 15th day of June, 1914, or on their failure to meet on said day, then within five days thereafter, and proceed to view, survey and locate said proposed road.

Matter of Petition of M. F. Beegle, et. al. for a County Road.

On this 3rd day of June, 1914, comes on for hearing the petition of M. F. Beegle, et. al., freeholders, residing in the road district or districts of said proposed road, praying for the establishment of a county road, described as follows:

Commencing at the one-fourth (1/4) section corner between sections six (6) in Township four (4) North Range One (1) west of the Willamette Meridian, and Section One (1) in Township Four (4) North, Range Two (2) West of the Willamette

Meridian; Thence running south on the Township line between sections, to the right of way of the St. Helens Timber Company's Logging Railroad, thence running West along said right of way of said Logging Railroad to the east line of the Northwest quarter of the southwest quarter of Section One (1) in Tp. 4 N. R. 2 West of W. M., thence running south along the east line of said Northwest quarter of the Southwest quarter of Section one (1) in Tp. 4, N. R. 2 West, to and terminating at the Southeast corner of said Northwest quarter of southeast quarter of Section ten (10) in said Township 4, N. R. 2 west and at a stake set in the center of the Kappler road.

Said road to be 40 feet in width.

And it satisfactorily appearing to the Court from proof filed herein, that due notice of the pendency of this proceeding has been given as by law required, that twelve of said petitioners are legal freeholders of this county, residing in the road district or districts of the proposed road, and that a good and sufficient bond has been given and filed herein;

It is therefore ordered by the Court that the Board of County Road Viewers meet at the beginning point of said proposed road on the 15th day of June, 1914, or on their failure to meet on said day, then within five days thereafter, and proceed to view, survey and locate said proposed road.

Matter of Petition of L. D. Sellard, et. al. for a County Road.

On this 3rd day of June, 1914, comes on for hearing the petition of L. D. Sellard, et. al., freeholders residing in the road district or districts of said proposed road, praying for the establishment of a county road, described as follows:

Beginning at the S W corner post of tract No. 50, according to Scappoose Acres Co., subdivision, and running in a southerly direction, on the old homestead road to the east line of tract No. 54; thence south on the east line of tract No. 54 to the S. E. corner of said tract; thence on an angle of 190 east of south a distance of 400 feet, ending in the center of the present county road.

All situated in the SE 1/4 of Sec. 18 T. 4, N. R. 2 W.

And it satisfactorily appearing to the Court from proof filed herein, that due notice of the pendency of this proceeding has been given as by law required, that twelve of said petitioners are legal freeholders of this county, residing in the road

district or districts of the proposed road, and that a good and sufficient bond has been given and filed herein;

It is therefore ordered by the Court that the Board of County Road Viewers meet at the beginning point of said proposed road on the 15th day of June, 1914, or on their failure to meet on said day, then within five days thereafter, and proceed to view, survey and locate said proposed road.

Matter of Petition of Gottlieb Anliker, et. al.

On this 3rd day of June, 1914, comes on for hearing the petition of G. Anliker, et. al., freeholders, residing in the road district or districts of said proposed road, praying for the establishment of a county road described as follows:

From the point of beginning at a stake marked R in front of Frank Clark's place on the County road, about 500 feet south of the N. W. corner of the SW 1/4 of Sec. 28 T. 6 N. R. 2 W., running in a southwesterly direction through Sec. 29 to a point near the SW corner thereof; thence southerly, about one half mile to a stake marked A, about 100 feet north of Anliker's barn in the NE 1/4 of Sec. 31, following the private road now in use in so far as may be advisable.

Said road to be forty feet in width.

And it satisfactorily appearing to the Court from proof filed herein, that due notice of the pendency of this proceeding has been given as by law required, that twelve of said petitioners are legal freeholders of this county, residing in the road district or districts of the proposed road, and that a good and sufficient bond has been given and filed herein;

It is therefore ordered by the Court that the Board of County Road Viewers meet at the beginning point of said proposed road on the 17th day of June, 1914, or on their failure to meet on said day, then within five days thereafter, and proceed to view, survey and locate said proposed road.

Matter of Deeds for County Roads.

On this 3rd day of June, 1914, comes on for hearing the petition of Columbia County Investment Company, forever dedicating certain strips of land for road purposes, being as follows:

Columbia County Investment Company, Two deeds for portions of Red Town Road.

J. W. Reed, et. ux, portions of Rock Creek Road.

J. J. Porney et. ux, portions of Rock Creek Road.

P. C. Jacobson, et. ux, portions of Kappler Road.

A. L. Reynolds, et. ux, portion of Kappler Road.

And the Court being advised in them after, it is ordered by the Court that said deeds be, and the same are hereby approved.

It is further ordered by the Court that the Clerk file the same for record.

Matter of Agreement with A and M. J. Seffert.

On this day A. Seffert and M. J. Seffert present to the Court their duly executed agreement for the sale of rock, in accordance with that certain order of the County Court made on the 7th day of February, 1914, and the Court being advised in the matter it is ordered by the Court that said agreement be, and the same is hereby approved.

It is further ordered by the Court that the Clerk file the same for record.

Matter of Bids for Road Work:

On this day bids for road work as heretofore advertised for, were opened and examined by the Court, being as follows:

ROCK CREEK ROAD, NEAR CROOKS PLACE

E. J. Mills, for the sum of \$1140.80.

WARREN-SPITZENBERG ROAD

P. H. Lund and John Kallberg, for the sum of \$1140.80.

And the Court being advised in the matter, it is ordered by the Court that the bid of E. J. Mills for improvement of Rock Creek Road near Crooks place, be accepted, and that a contract be entered into for the faithful performance of the same.

And it appearing to the Court that the bid of P. H. Lund & John Kallberg, for the improvement of the Warren-Spitzenberg Road is too high it is ordered by the Court that said bid be, and the same is hereby rejected.

It is further ordered by the Court that said improvement be performed by the County, under the direction of the County Roadmaster.

Matter of Petition of F. E. Lovegren et. al. for improvement of part of Stewart Creek Road.

On this day this matter coming on for consideration, and the Court not being fully advised in the matter, it is ordered that said petition be referred to the County Roadmaster for further investigation.

Matter of Petition of C. H. Aplary for draining portion of Aplary Road.

On this day this matter coming on for consideration and the Court being advised, it is ordered that said petition be, and the same is hereby referred to the County Roadmaster.

Matter of Report of County Roadmaster on Petitions for Road Improvements.

On this day Leo G. Titus, Roadmaster presents to the Court his written report on the petitions for road improvements referred to said Roadmaster 7th day of May, 1914, and the Court being advised in the matter it is ordered by the Court that said report be, and the same is hereby approved.

Matter of Report of County Roadmaster on Petitions for Road Improvements.

On this day the report of C. H. Roberts, Expert Accountant, of the accounts of A. E. Thomas, Sheriff, from December 31, 1913, to May 23, 1914, is examined by the Court, and the Court being advised in the matter, it is ordered that said report be, and the same is hereby approved.

Matter of Undertaking of John, Sheriff.

On this day C. H. John presents to the Court his official statement in the sum of \$10,000, and taking in the sum of \$1,000 collector of delinquent taxes, Fidelity & Deposit Company of land, as sureties, as heretofore the 26th day of May, duly approved by the County Judge, and the County Clerk, and the Court being advised in the matter hereby approved.

It is further ordered by the Court that certain personal bond in the sum of \$10,000.00 heretofore filed herein and duly approved by the Court be, and the same is hereby cancelled.

It is further ordered by the Court that the bondmen on said bond be relieved from any liability, after said 26th day of May.

Whereupon, Court adjourns Thursday, June 4, 1914, Special Day.

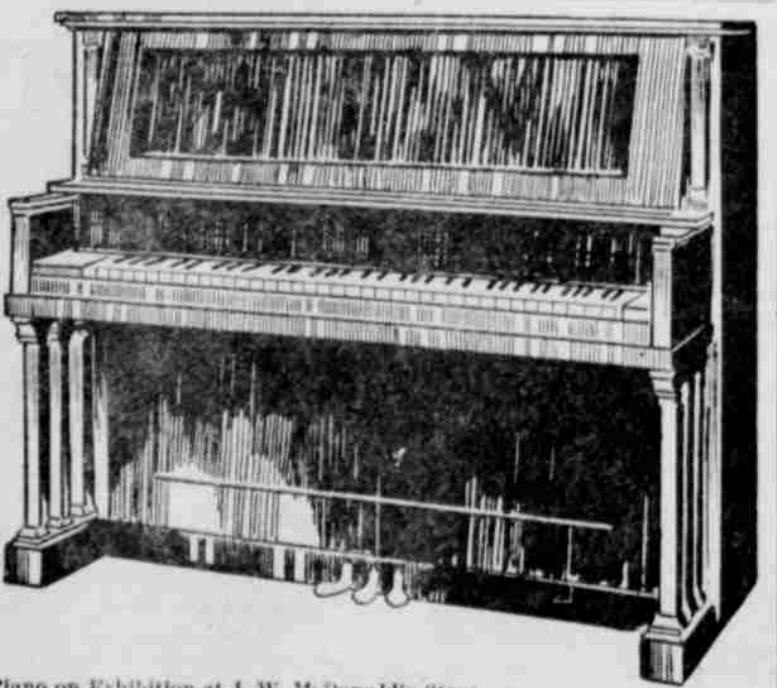

Rules and Regulations

RULES AND REGULATIONS PERTAINING TO THE NATIONAL SALES CO., TRADE CAMPAIGN PLAN

RULE 1. The merchants shall issue votes as per following schedule, excepting as hereafter may be mentioned:

- 100 for \$1.00 on cash sales.
- 200 for \$1.00 in merchandise paid with due bills.
- 300 for \$1.00 on payments of old accounts.
- 200 for \$1.00 on due bills paid.
- 200 for \$1.00 on bargain or clearance sales.
- And votes will be given at the time sales are made only.

In reference to issuing votes on old accounts, they may be issued for the payment of old accounts, that were incurred prior to this date. Votes will not be given on new charge accounts unless this particular account is paid within thirty days, when votes may be issued if the merchant is willing and so orders.

RULE 2. Votes will be issued with a time limit of one week, and must be cast in ballot box, provided for that purpose before the expiration of the time limit. Before casting votes, make a record for your own guidance.

In order to facilitate voting you are requested to place your votes in an envelope and seal it. Please write the number of votes the envelope contains and the name of the candidate you desire to vote for on the outside.

RULE 3. Employees, clerks and relatives of the merchant and newspaper cannot participate as candidates.

RULE 4. Merchants shall in no instance issue votes until such votes have been properly stamped with their firm name. Customers should refuse them otherwise.

RULE 5. The soliciting of votes in the merchant's stores, in front of store or on premises is PROHIBITED.

RULE 6. A vote that is scratched or marked in any manner after it leaves the merchant's hands, shall be thrown out, providing this defacing should appear that a figure has been tampered with.

RULE 7. Six weeks from the opening date, candidates will no longer be entered, unless by special arrangement with the merchant.

RULE 8. Everybody is invited to nominate candidates. All that is necessary is to send in the name of any young lady in the community. This will entitle her to 2000 nominating votes and she will be entered as a candidate.

RULE 9. Votes are not transferable after being cast.

RULE 10. Votes that are not properly stamped with the merchant's signature, or votes with time limit expired will not be accepted.

RULE 11. A committee selected by the merchants in the campaign will count the votes each week, beginning with the third week and report the results to the newspaper.
