

COLUMBIA COUNTY, OREGON

LOCATION:

In the Northwestern part of Oregon, on the Columbia River, with about 30 miles of river front.

AREA:

About 740 square miles. 42,500 acres.

TILLABLE LAND:

25,725 acres. This is land that is actually in cultivation and cleared, exclusive of town lots.

NON-TILLABLE LAND:

406,750 acres, which includes all timber where there is more than 20,000 feet on a quarter section, also all occupied land where it is not suitable for and in no condition for cultivation.

FOREST:

About seven and one half to eight billion feet.

ASSESSED VALUE OF FOREST: \$1,000,000.

ASSESSED VALUE OF TILLABLE LAND: \$1,000,000.

TOTAL ASSESSED VALUATION OF ALL PROPERTY:

\$24,000,000.

MILES OF COUNTY ROADS:

500 miles, some of which is in first class condition, some in fair condition and some in very poor condition.

MILES OF RAILROADS:

About 125 miles which includes the main line of the S. P. & S. and the various logging roads.

POPULATION:

Census of 1910 gives 10,780 but a careful estimate the year gives it at least 15,000.

CLIMATE:

Temperate. During the summer the thermometer rarely reaches 100° in the shade and in the coldest weather of winter snow weather is almost unknown. During the winter months there is considerable rain, but not too much, just enough to assure crops. Crop failures are unknown.

PRODUCTS:

Fruits of all kinds, especially apples, pears, plums and berries; grain and grasses; pasture land of all kinds and dairying.

SHIPPING:

Ships from all parts of the world carry Columbia County products down the Columbia River and to the markets of the world. A through line of railroads traverse the county from the North to the South. River boats carry local products to local markets at low rates.

LAW:

Thousands of acres of first class land can be purchased at reasonable prices upon which are stamps left from the timber operations. The land is especially suited for farming, fruit raising and dairying.

ST. HELENS:

A city on the Columbia River, 50 miles from Portland, with a population of 5,000 people. The County Seat of Columbia County. A Four year Standard High School. Methodist, Congregational, Episcopal and Catholic Churches. All the leading fraternal orders. City water system owned by the city sufficient to supply a city of 10,000 people. Electric lights, graded and macadamized streets, sewers. Principal industries are lumbering, shipbuilding, cannery, stone quarrying, fishing and trapping. Ten large saw mills with a capacity of 250,000 feet per day, more than 5 million feet of lumber shipped each month; several large oyster growing vessels built each year; timber treated with creosote and stripped oil along the coast. Two big stone quarries and rock crushing plants in continuous operation. An average of 300 tons of Columbia River Salmon caught and marketed. A farming country back of it that cannot be excelled in the world. Several new business blocks now under construction. Five miles of sewer being built.

INDUSTRIES:

Lumbering and timber is the principal industry, on about twenty-five saw mills. Salmon fishing on Columbia River is also an important industry. Fish and fruit raising; Stone quarrying; Ship building and kinds of lumber manufacturing places.

There are fine opportunities for the small farmer, man, fruit grower and truck gardener. Also a few choice deep water sites for manufacturing plants.

THE DELTA GARDENS:
