

COURT PROCEEDINGS

Session—Petition for County Road Board—Claims Filed and Bills Allowed.

Wednesday, August 4, 1915. 6th Judicial Day.

On this 4th day of August, 1915, came on for hearing the claim of William A. Tannier, of Seapooose, for indemnity in the sum of \$100.00, for the loss of two grade cows over two years old, slaughtered by the State Live Stock Board, under chapter 14, General Laws of 1913, and it appeared to the Court from the certificates and affidavits on file relating thereto, that said animals were slaughtered on December 10th, 1914, and on May 1915, under the supervision of G. Stuckney, duly appointed supervising officer, at the slaughter house of J. L. Smith, at Stockdale, Oregon, and that said claimant has complied with all the provisions of said chapter 14, Laws of 1913, with the exception of the provision thereof requiring that said claim shall be filed within 30 days from the date of such slaughter.

And it appearing to the Court that H. Lytle, State Veterinarian, has later dated June 20, 1915, on file, advised that said claim be allowed.

It is therefore ordered by the Court that said claim be, and the same is hereby allowed.

It is further ordered by the Court that the Clerk be, and he is hereby authorized and instructed to issue a general fund warrant in favor of said claimant, in the sum of \$100.00, being one-half of said sum allowed as such indemnity.

On this 4th day of August, 1915, came on for hearing the claim of D. Freeman, of Seapooose, Oregon, for indemnity in the sum of Sixty-two and 10-100 Dollars, for one grade cow over two years old, and one registered bull, slaughtered by the State Live Stock Board, under chapter 14, General Laws of 1913, and it appearing to the Court from the certificates and affidavits on file relating thereto, that said animals were slaughtered at Freeman ranch, Seapooose, Oregon, on the 14th day of May, 1914, under the supervision of G. Stuckney, duly appointed supervising officer, and that said claimant has complied with all the provisions of said chapter 14, Laws of 1913, with the exception of the provision thereof requiring that said claim shall be filed within 30 days from the date of such slaughter.

And it appearing to the Court that H. Lytle, State Veterinarian, has later dated June 20, 1915, on file, advised that said claim be allowed.

It is therefore ordered by the Court that said claim be, and the same is hereby allowed.

It is further ordered by the Court that the Clerk be, and he is hereby authorized and instructed to issue a general fund warrant in favor of said claimant, in the sum of \$31.25, being one-half of said sum so allowed as such indemnity.

It is further ordered by the Court that the Clerk be, and he is hereby authorized and instructed to issue a general fund warrant in favor of said claimant, in the sum of \$31.25, being one-half of said sum so allowed as such indemnity.

On this 4th day of August, 1915, came on for hearing the claim of J. L. Smith, of Seapooose, Oregon, for indemnity in the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars, for two grade cows over two years old, slaughtered under the provisions of chapter 14, General Laws of 1913, and it appearing to the Court that said animals have not elapsed from the date of such slaughter and the date of filing of such claim, and the Court being advised in the matter, ordered by the Court that a public hearing of said claim be held on Wednesday, the 1st day of September, 1915, at the hour of 10 o'clock A. M., at the County Court room, for purpose of determining whether said claimant has complied with all laws in regard thereto, and whether it is entitled to receive said indemnity.

On this day the Clerk presents to the Court his report of scalp bounties during the month of July, 1915, authorized by Sections 5747-5761, of the Oregon Laws, and Chapter 14, General Laws of 1913, showing number and amount of warrants issued, the names of the persons to whom issued and the number and amount of each warrant, being as follows:

July 14, No. 445, to G. A. Crosby, in the sum of \$2.00.

And the Court being advised in the matter, it is ordered by the Court that said report be, and the same is hereby approved.

Matter of petition of A. Kantola, et al., for a County road.

This matter having heretofore, to-wit: on the 9th day of July, 1915, been considered by the Court upon the second reading of the report of the Board of County Road Viewers, said report being to the effect that said road should not be established and advising the establishment of a gateway from the premises of Andrew Kantola to the Columbia Highway, and the Court having taken the matter under advisement; now, on this 4th day of August, 1915, the Court being fully advised, it is ordered by the Court that said petition be, and the same is hereby denied without prejudice to the filing of a petition for the establishment of a gateway as suggested by said Board of County Road Viewers.

On this 4th day of August, 1915, there is presented to the Court an order of the Judge of the Juvenile Court of this County, allowing Widow's Pension in the sum of \$32.50 per month, in favor of Amy Peer, in accordance with chapter 42, General Laws of 1913; and the Court being advised in the matter, it is ordered by the Court that the Clerk be, and he is hereby instructed to issue a general fund warrant in the sum of \$32.50 in favor of said Amy Peer, and a like warrant on the first day of each month hereafter, until the further order of this Court.
