In the matter of sewer in block 34, reported by water superintendent, that the same was blocked up. Referred to city marshal.

Ordinance No. 190, ordered published in both papers.

Council decided that the time be extended for bonding in sewer district Nos. 3, 4 and 7.

The usual monthly bills were audited and allowed.

Health officers requested to inspect the premises of J. Q. Gage, in relation to addition to barn.

Report of Councilman White in reference to the fire department being furnished more hose was referred to fire committee.

Report of fire chief relative to the building being altered for a picture show by Mr. Brinn, that it was a dangerous proposition. After discussion the matter was laid over.

**SPEEDER ARRESTED**

On Thursday last, when Louis Fountain, who gave his address as of Portland, attempted to turn the corner at the St. Helens hotel at a high rate of speed, the motorcycle turned turtle and threw both his woman companion and himself into the street. The woman was unconscious for a time and Dr. Wade was called to render the necessary medical attention. In addition to painful bruises, the woman had a broken wrist. Acting Marshal Fred Watkins, who saw the accident, thought the man was breaking the ordinance relating to speeding and reckless driving, which opinion was shared in by those who witnessed the accident. He accordingly took the man into custody. At the hearing before Recorder Quick, Fountain pled guilty and was fined \$5 and costs. A little more attention to this speeding ordinance will result in more careful driving and not endanger the lives of the pedestrians.

**ORDINANCE NO. 190**  
 An ordinance declaring it the duty of all owners of land adjoining any street in the City of St. Helens, to construct, reconstruct and maintain in good repair all the sidewalks or steps in front of said land, at their own cost and expense.  
 The City of St. Helens does ordain as follows:  
 Section 1. It is hereby declared to be the duty, and it is the duty, of all owners of all land adjoining any street in the City of St. Helens to construct, reconstruct and maintain in good repair, the sidewalks or steps in front of said land, at the expense and cost of such owners.  
 Section 2. That whenever it becomes necessary for said City to construct, reconstruct or maintain in good repair, any sidewalk, because of the refusal or failure of the abutting property owner so to do, the cost of such improvement shall be taxed to the owner of such abutting property, and constitute a lien upon said property.
