## INDUSTRIAL REVIEW

Portland—Material now being assembled to build five 8,800 ton steel freight steamers.

Roseburg—Forty men at work on telephone line to Myrtle Point.

Oregon direct primary cost candidates \$56,942; state and counties about \$150,000.

Shelburn—New road to Santiam river and ferry being built.

Roseburg—Contractors on ground and material ordered for new federal building.

Myrtle Creek—New bridge across Umpqua opened to traffic.

Sutton lake irrigation project, of Jefferson county, bonds being sold to irrigate 12,000 acres. Water to be stored in Blue and Sutton lakes, 25 miles distant from center of project.

Income taxes collected in Oregon for year just closed \$118,437, as against \$123,306 for year previous.

Marshfield—State will supervise expenditure of good roads bond issue of Coos county of \$262,000.

Cottage Grove—O. P. & E. Ry. erecting gasoline storage warehouse.

The mails are flooded with appeals for publicity at public expense, written by officials drawing salaries, printed at public expense, stamped with postage paid for by the taxpayers, sent out from offices paid for by the public—to increase public burdens.

Springwater — Klatsch sawmill now in operation employing 15 men.

Farmers of Polk and Benton counties co-operating with state for water grade highway from Salem to Eugene.

Coos Bay bar survey shows depth of channel 27 feet low tide, 600 feet wide.

Williamina to have new M. E. church.

American Soda Products Co. of San Francisco installing plant northeast of Paisley to refine alkali.

Echo—O. W. R. & N. Co. will build 2100 feet passing track here.

Hood River—Apple confection products factory to be built.

Coquille—Burned creamery to be rebuilt.

Newport to build concrete sea wall 710 feet long.

Baker—Rich strikes reported in Conner Creek mines.

Cottage Grove—Standard Oil Co. permitted to install station here.

Grants Pass will have sugar beet silo to feed 150 head of cattle.

Stayton—Black Eagle mines develop \$200 per ton ore.

Marshfield—Contract let for radio station.

Burns—Crane is new terminus of railroad into Harney valley.

Springfield to have new skating rink built.

Estacada to hard surface main business street.

Iron ore deposit located 14 miles from Cottage Grove.

Portland woolen mills has bought and is moving Ellensburg woolen mill here.

Railroad men say strike sentiment is dead. An industrial plant can stop work at end of eight hours, but trains bearing livestock, fruit, merchandise and other products of the ranch, orchard and farm must be kept moving to final destination. To stop them at the end of eight hours would spell ruin to the railroad and public alike.

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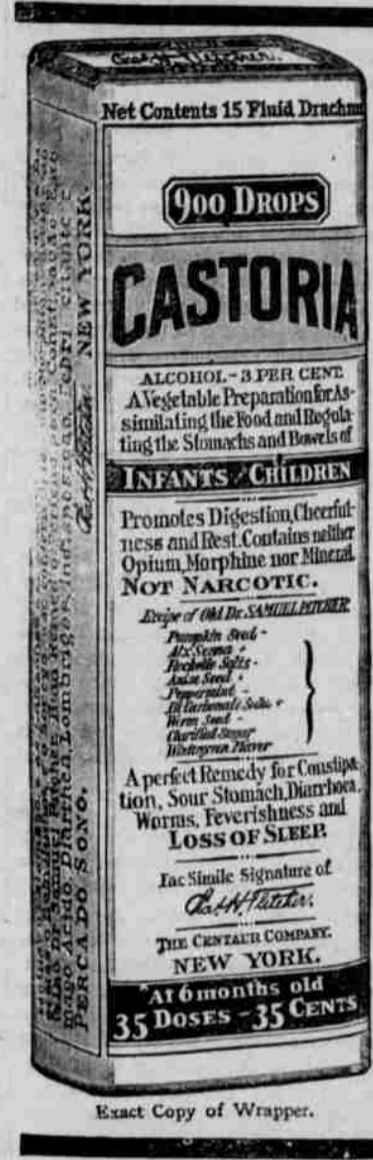
