COURT PROCEEDINGS

On the 5th day of June, 1916, comes on for hearing the claim of Lewis Snyder, of Scappoose, Oregon, for indemnity in the sum of twenty-five dollars, for three grade Holstein cows, over two years old, slaughtered by the State Live Stock Sanitary Board, under Chapter 14, General Laws of 1913, and it appearing to the Court from the certificates and affidavits on file relating thereto, that said animals were slaughtered on the 11th day of May, 1916, at Schlosser Bros., Columbia Slough, under the supervision of E. E. Cline, V. S., and that said claimant has complied with all the provisions of said chapter 14, General Laws of 1913, it is therefore ordered by the Court that said claim be, and the same is hereby allowed.

It is further ordered by the Court that the Clerk be, and he is hereby authorized and instructed to issue a general fund warrant in favor of said Lewis Snyder, in the sum of thirty-seven and 50-100 dollars, being one-half of said sum so allowed as such indemnity.

It is further ordered by the Court that the Clerk prepare and transmit to the Secretary of State, a certified copy of this order.

On this day the report of the Board of County Road Viewers on the S. L. Butler Road No. 2, was read in open court the first time.

Thursday July 6th, 1916.

On this day the report of the Board of County Road Viewers on the S. L. Butler Road No. 2, was read in open court the second time, and the Court not being fully advised in the matter, it is ordered by the Court that said petition be, and the same hereby is continued.

On this day D. C. Kirby and Frances Kirby present to the Court their duly executed deed of conveyance, dedicating a certain strip of land for road purposes, situated in Sec. 17, 7-3, and the Court being advised in the matter, it is ordered by the Court that said deed be, and the same hereby is approved.

It is further ordered by the Court that the County Clerk be, and he hereby is instructed to issue a General Fund warrant in the sum of \$50.00, in favor of said D. C. Kirby, as payment in full for said right of way and damages sustained hereby.

On this day J. W. Hunt, County Treasurer, presents to the Court his duly executed bond in the sum of \$20,000.00, written by National Surety Company, heretofore approved by the County Judge, and the Court being advised in the matter, it is ordered by the Court that said bond be, and the same hereby is approved.

On this 6th day of July, 1916, the Clerk presents to the Court his written report of seal bonuses issued during the month of June, 1916, being as follows: June 7, 1916, Warrant No. 2707 in the sum of \$4.00 in favor of Clyde Johnson; June 26, Warrant No. 3054 in the sum of \$2.00 in favor of H. W. Babinsky; June 28, Warrant No. 3055, in the sum of \$2.00, in favor of W. H. Brunson.

And the Court being advised in the matter, it is ordered by the Court that said report be, and the same hereby is approved.

On this 6th day of July, 1916, based upon the written petition of Thomas Morris, Sr., supported by a duly executed bond of indemnity, it is ordered by the Court that the Clerk be, and he hereby is authorized and instructed to issue duplicate county warrant No. 892, 5th Series A, dated September 2, 1915, and indorsed by the County Treasurer Oct. 8, 1915, in the sum of \$8.00, in favor of Thomas Morris, Sr.

On this 6th day of July, 1916, based upon the written petition of Erickson, Basse & Co., as present owners, supported by a duly executed bond of indemnity, it is ordered by the Court that the Clerk be, and he hereby is authorized and instructed to issue duplicate Warrant No. 2253, 5th Series A, dated April 7, 1915, and indorsed by the County Treasurer April 10, 1915, in the sum of \$11.40, in favor of W. C. Groaves, and deliver same to Erickson, Basse & Co.

J. E. Mellen having heretofore presented to the Court his duly verified claim in the sum of \$25.00, for the death of a helper, alleged to have been occasioned by reason of defective condition of county bridge located in the road running north and south along the east side of the NE 1/4 of Sec. 26, 6-2, and the Court having taken the matter under advisement, now on this 6th day of July, 1916, the Court being fully advised in the matter, it is ordered by the Court that said claim be, and the same hereby is rejected.
