MANAGER J. H. PRICE HAS RESIGNED

Known Shipbuilder Will Open Offices in Portland.

J. H. Price, for the last five years manager and designer for the St. Helens Shipbuilding Company, has resigned his position and will open offices in Portland. He will make a specialty of naval construction and designing. While he will, in a way, sever his connection with the shipbuilding company, he is retained by it to act in an advisory capacity. Mr. Price is probably the best known shipbuilder on the Pacific coast. Before coming to America, 18 years ago, he was engaged in the building of iron vessels, but seeing opportunity for the construction of wooden ocean-going vessels, he began to make a specialty of this branch of ship construction. In the fifteen years of his career as a

shipbuilder he has constructed 48 vessels, many of which are now plying up and down the coast. He has designed and constructed every vessel which flies the McCormick house flag, and his latest achievement was a designing, planning and construction of the big motor vessel City of Portland, and the two smaller motor vessels, the Ruth and June.

For the past several months Mr. Price has been acting in an advisory capacity with a large British Columbia shipbuilding company, and it is understood he will still serve them. Mr. Price has made many friends during his residence in St. Helens and he is glad that, in a manner, he will still be connected with the St. Helens yard. The Mist cannot learn the exact date Mr. Price will open his Portland offices.

OREGON HAS \$1,138,802.80

The state of Oregon disbursed \$1,797,623.10 in the three months ending September 30 last, according to the report of State Treasurer Kay made Friday. Receipts for the quarter totaled \$1,081,384.32. The balance on hand September 30 was \$1,138,802.80. Of this amount the general fund showed a balance of \$765,129.13. In the common school fund the balance on hand, principal and interest investments on September 30 totaled \$6,398,932.91.

ORDINANCE NO. 197.

Now therefore, The City of St. Helens, does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That there be, and there is, hereby granted and appropriated out of the general funds of the Treasury of said City, the sum of One thousand dollars to be paid the said Emma H. Tompkins, in full of all demands against the City; and the Recorder of said City is hereby authorized and ordered to draw a warrant on the general fund of said City in said sum, in favor of said Tompkins, upon the dismissal of said action and a proper release of all claims against said City.
