SHIPPING NOTES FOR THE WEEK

Barge Recently Sold Goes South With Lumber Cargo. The steamer Nehalem arrived in Wednesday night and is taking on a cargo of 750,000 feet of lumber for delivery at San Pedro. Capt. W. C. McNaught, of Portland, marine surveyor for this district, was a business visitor to St. Helens Wednesday. The steamer Johan Poulsen, after taking on 200,000 feet of lumber at the docks of the Columbia County Mill, left down river Tuesday night to complete her cargo. Capt. S. C. Mitchell, of Portland, who will command the motor vessel S. M. Allard, is here superintending the loading of barge No. 41, which takes a cargo of lumber to California points. Barge 41, recently sold by the Columbia Contract Company to the Hercules Powder Company of California, is having cargo put aboard and will leave out in several days for California. She will probably be towed down by one of the McCormick boats. The steamer Laqua, recently purchased by the Parr-McCormick Steamship Company, is due to arrive in today and will load a full cargo of lumber. The steamer was formerly a wrecking boat but the scarcity of tonnage on the coast drew her out of the salvaging operations. The steamer Klamath, Capt. "Slats" Cullen, has hung up an enviable record for a fast voyage from Columbia river to San Pedro and return. The steamer arrived in Saturday, just ten days from the time she sailed from here for the California port. The Klamath left out Monday night with a cargo of 1,066,000 feet of lumber and piling, which is to be delivered at San Pedro.

ASTORIA WILL HAVE ANOTHER SHIPYARD

Spokane Company Enters Shipbuilding Field. Actual construction of the shipbuilding plant at Warrenton for the American Shipbuilding Company is to start at once, according to H. B. Spear, president of the concern, who was in Portland yesterday. Engineers are on the ground now making the surveys and contracts for the construction of six ways, shops and offices, will be let at once. A tract with 1,500 feet of frontage on Young's bay, adjacent to Skippanon creek and Flavel terminals of the Great Northern Pacific Steamship Company has been secured. The American Shipbuilding Company was formed at Spokane and includes among its officers A. L. Flowering, president of the Western Forestry & Conservation Associations, now in session at the Portland hotel, C. T. Diamond, H. M. Eggleston and P. W. Milburn. "We have contracts for six motorships of the Columbia river type secured through Whittlesey & Whittlesey of New York City," declared Mr. Spear this morning. "These vessels are to be 275 feet in length, 48 feet beam, 23.6 feet depth of hold, and to have a dead weight capacity of 3,500 tons and a lumber carrying capacity of 2,000,000 tons. They are to be four masted vessels. "We are figuring, too, on four motorships which will be 315 feet in length and the biggest wooden motorships ever constructed. The Bureau Veritas has agreed to accept our plans for these vessels under 15 year policies and it seems certain the contracts will be signed."
