#### OREGON LIEN LAWS MAY BE CHANGED

Four amendments to the lien laws of Oregon have been proposed by a joint committee representing the following Portland organizations: Builders' Exchange, Building Material Dealert Credit Association, Central Labor Council, Oregon Planton Mill Openion (1987) ing Mill Owners' Association, Asso-ciation of Building Owners & Man-agers, Portland Realty Board and Chamber of Commerce. G. W. Herron, secretary-treasurer of the Build-ing Matsial Dealers' Credit Association, is the chairman of the commit-tee. The amendments follow:

gage lien enforcement against a residence built by the owner and occupied by him so that a lien may be created when both husband and wife sign a contract order for material for addition or other improvement.

To protect non-resident property wners by allowing them the same protection as now given through the posting of a notice on the premises, this to be done by their filing with the county clerk a standing notice that they will not be responsible for labor or material thereafter employed upon the building.

To require the dealer to send to the owner only one notice that the contractor is buying from him in order to protect his lien rights, in-stead of requiring that a copy of the invoice of each delivery be sent, as now provided. This amendment folpresent statute was enacted through error, it is said.

To put a stop clause in bonds fur-nished by bonding companies so that a dealer furnishing material to pub lic works must present his bill within one year, instead of six months as at present, thus allowing the bonding companies to close the surety within a shorter period.
