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RAILWAY BECOMES GENEROUS TO HELP

Union Pacific Follows Its Bonus With Generous Boost for Employees.

President J. D. Farrell of the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation Company has just made announcement of that company's plan this year to give its employees the privilege of cultivating its right-of-way and other lands that may be available for such purposes. "This is done," he explains, "as an aid to national preparedness through the production of vegetable foods."

No charge will be made for the privilege, and the only condition is that such products as are grown shall be confined to the use of employees and their families.

"Our great family of employees," he adds, "can splendidly assist in the nation's program of preparedness by adding to the food supply, and all who can do so are earnestly urged to take advantage of this offer."

This announcement further provides that lands not applied for within ten days will be offered to others than employees, when suitably recommended, on the same terms.

This move brings into possible productivity a very large area of land fertile and capable as the average farm, and if the offer can be improved it will absolutely remove from the employe's family expense account the cost of vegetables for an entire year.

LARGE IMPORTATIONS OF SOYA BEAN OIL

Japanese Product Going East in Special Train Cargoes.

A special train of thirty tank cars carrying 8,000 gallons of Japanese soya bean oil each, or a total cargo of 240,000 gallons, valued at \$165,000, has just been dispatched from Seattle via the Union Pacific system to Cincinnati to be used by Procter & Gamble as essential oils in the manufacture of soap.

The use of soya bean oil in the United States is of comparatively recent origin. A small quantity was imported in 1909 for the first time. Since then the industry has grown to a production of about \$7,000,000 annually, but never before in such quantities as to require a special train of specially built tanks for transportation.

The oil is used in replacing beef and pork fats and other forms of animal greases which have become too expensive for such purposes. The industry has grown to such an extent that firms in the east using it have found it necessary to station their representatives in Seattle to handle it. These firms include extensive paint manufacturers who have found in this oil a valuable substitute for linseed oil in the mixing of paints and varnishes, and the extent to which it is being handled has justified the Union Pacific in the construction of special tank cars for that purpose.

WISCONSIN COMPANY RESUMES LOGGING

Another of the big Cowlitz county camps got under way the first of this week, after the winter shut down, when the Wisconsin Logging & Timber Company at Midway put a large crew of men at work in the woods. The Wisconsin company operates at a high elevation, using an inclined roadway, down which the loaded cars are lowered by donkeys to get the timber out from one of their operating sides, and much snow remained in the woods when logging was resumed. About 300,000 feet of logs a day are dumped into the Cowlitz at Oak Point from the Wisconsin company railway each day when the camp is operating to full capacity, and more than 250 men are employed.—Kelsonian.

The Wheeler sawmill capacity will be increased from 150,000 to 200,000 feet per day. The resumption of operations is warranted from the orders booked ahead.

Robert Strahorn reports that it is possible that construction on the proposed Oregon-California & Eastern Railroad will be started this summer. Because of the increase in prices of steel the cost of the road will be increased \$2,000 per mile.
