### COMMUNICATED

First Semi-monthly Agricultural Report.

To the Columbia County Agricultural Expert:

Having become thoroughly imbued with the patriotic idea of a city spud patch, the minister and I met, about the 1st of March, and formed a potato copartnership. No sooner done than said, we had the tools on the ground and the city lot very nicely and unevenly divided. I did the dividing, and rather than appear hogish I gave the preacher much the bigger half.
